**"TOLSTOY'S VISION" OF
CONFLICT IS RECALLED**

Message to Kaiser in 1911 Contains Predictions of World-Wide
War, Rise of New Napoleon and United States of Nations

A sudden notion induced the Kaiser
to write to the Czar in the early autumn
of 1911 asking to obtain for him a mes-
sage from Tolstoy. Something that the
philosopher had never written before
was the request made by the Emperor.
The Czar, desirous of obliging his
"cousin"—all sovereigns claim blood
and divine relationship—commanded
Countess Nastasia Tolstoy, grandniece
of the sage, to interview Leo Nicolae-
vitch, as he was familiarly called, and
to secure from him the desired docu-
ment.

This prophetic message, singularly
timely at this hour, is known as "Tol-
stoy's Vision" by his admirers. Printed
in Russian in 1912, it was translated and
first circulated among the friends of
the great Muscovite philosopher as a
privately printed and little-known pam-
phlet.

Tolstoy Hears Command.

Following the royal command, Count-
ess Tolstoy visited her grand-uncle at
his country estate and explained briefly
her mission. He listened curiously and
replied:

"Very strange. I would be glad to
send a message to royalty, but the
trouble with me is that I have writ-
ten all my life messages for the mob.
I am not accustomed to the conventions
of court etiquette. However, I will think
the matter over."

A few moments afterwards her aged
host asked the Countess to write, as
his hands were then paralyzed. Tol-
stoy slowly leaned back in his chair,
covered his eyes with his hands, and
remained absolutely silent.

Message is Begun.

Then, straightening up, like one in a
trance, he began in a low and hollow
voice:

"This is a revelation of events of a
universal character, which must short-
ly come to pass. Their spiritual out-
lines are now before my eyes. I see
floating upon the surface of the sea of
human fate the huge silhouette of a
nude woman. She is—with her beauty,
her poise, her smile, her jewels—a super-
Venus. Nations rush madly after her,
each of them eager to attract her espe-
cially. But she, like an eternal court-
esan, flirts with all. In her hair ornate
of diamonds and rubies is en-
graved her name: 'Commercialism.'
As alluring and bewitching as she
seems, much destruction and agony fol-
low in her wake. Her breath, reeking
of sordid transactions, her voice of met-
allic character, like gold, and her look
of greed are so much poison to the na-
tions who fall victims to her charms.

Three Torches Carried.

"And behold, she has three gigantic
arms with three torches of universal
corruption in her hand. The first torch
represents the flame of war, that the
beautiful courtesan carries from city to
city, and country to country. Patriot-
ism answers with flashes of honest
flame, but the end is the roar of guns
and musketry.

"The second torch bears the flame of
bigotry and hypocrisy. It lights the
lamps only in temples and on the altars
of false institutions. It carries the seed
of falsity and fanaticism. It kindles
the minds that are still in cradles and
follows them to their graves.

"The third torch is that of the law,
that dangerous foundation of all un-
authentic traditions, which first does its
work in the family, then sweeps through
the larger worlds of literature, art and
statesmanship.

New Napoleon Enters.

"The great conflagration will start
about 1912, set by the torch of the
first arm in the countries of Southeast-

**Issuance of Large Foreign Money Or-
ders Forbidden.**

Orders have been sent to postoffices
of the United States by the postmaster
general to refuse to issue foreign postal
money orders for large amounts during
the present war in Europe. The order
does not forbid the sending of ordinary
amounts usually sent by people in this
country to Europe. The notice is as
follows:

"The treaties concluded by the United
States with foreign countries, give
each postal administration power to sus-
pend, temporarily, the exchange of
money orders 'in case the course of
exchange or any other circumstance
should give rise to abuses, or cause detri-
ment to the postal revenue.'

"The sudden and extraordinary ad-
vance in bankers' exchange due to the
public apprehension of a general Euro-
pean war may lead to 'abuses' of the
money order system, because of the
much lower rates of conversion obtain-
able at postoffices.

"In these unusual circumstances, and
until the return of normal conditions,
postmasters may decline to accept applica-
tions for international money orders
when made for unusually large sums,
and when there is reason to believe the
orders are wanted for speculative pur-
poses."

ern Europe. It will develop into a de-
structive calamity in 1913. In that
year I see all Europe in flames and
bleeding. I hear the lamentations of
huge battlefields. But about the year
1915 a strange figure from the North—
a new Napoleon—enters the stage of
the bloody drama. He is a man of little
militaristic training, a writer or a jour-
nalist, but in his grip most of Europe
will remain till 1925.

"The end of the great calamity will
mark a new political era for the old
world. There will be left no empires
or kingdoms, but the world will form
a federation of the United States of
Nations. There will remain only four
great giants—the Anglo-Saxons, the
Latins, the Slavs and the Mongolians."

MUCH CASH IN YEAR**

Statistics as to the wealth, debt and
taxation of Lane County are being com-
piled by W. G. Copley, of the United
States census bureau. Mr. Copley states
that no other state in the union can
equal Oregon in the matter of bonded
indebtedness, as there is only one
county in this state which has a bonded
indebtedness. Mr. Copley says that the
total receipts and cash on hand at the
end of the year 1912 was \$1,015,033.04,
a very large sum to be handled in a
single year.

He also says that the books of Lane
County are kept better than those of a
majority of counties in the state.
