Deer Season Summarily Closed Because of Fire Danger

Danger of forest fires from the camp fires of hunters led Governor West to issue a proclamation Saturday declaring the deer hunting season closed. The order became effective Monday. The season will be re-opened, if, before the expiration of the lawful open season, sufficient rain falls to obviate the present danger.

Many local hunters are decidedly disgruntled over the order, as hunting grounds are close enough about this city to make it possible to go out and hunt during the day and return home in the evening without having to build any fires. These hunters feel that the order works a hardship on them. A number of hunting parties from this city are now in the woods and have not yet received word of the closing of the season.

State Forester Elliott, who conferred with Governor West on the subject, said that while he had not asked that the season be closed, he nevertheless felt that it is a good thing. He said that the office had received a number of reports of forest fires started by careless hunters.

The deer season would normally have closed November 1.

COUNTY FAIRS TO BE BIGGER AND BETTER THAN EVER

Portland, Ore., Aug. 11.—(Special.)—Following a record-breaking harvest in practically every section of the state, Oregon will this fall witness a large number of the best fairs ever held in the Northwest. Twenty-five counties have announced the dates of their exhibitions. Coos and Curry counties will join forces while ambitious Clackamas County will stage two fairs. Portland will hold its Manufacturers' and Land Products Show in late October and early November, and this city will also be represented, through its commercial organizations or business houses, at every one of the county fairs.

Everything Doing in Oregon in the Way of Payrolls, Factories and Enterprises Employing Labor.

State Prison Supt. Lawson is putting in a rock crushing plant near the feeble minded institution to be worked with convict labor and to supply material for state and county highways on a large scale.

The Dalles will install four drinking fountains.

Federal and state officials are urging a large expenditure for extermination of rats in Oregon.

The Perry veneer plant at Bandon has resumed operations.

Telephone rates have been advanced at Newport on basis of revenues sufficient to maintain improved service.

Abuse of direct legislation is shown by the attorney general when he says the bill to abolish the desert land board should be called; "A measure disposing of the present state engineer and putting another man in his place at a higher salary."

Oregon City will expend \$600 on fountains, feeding racks and hitching posts for horses to draw country trade.

G. D. Fell of Pendleton is building a large cleaning plant.

The base line road is to be paved with Warrenite from Portland to Sandy at 88 cents per square yard.

Geo. Melvin Miller will erect a \$25,000 hotel building at Florence.

Eugene Odd Fellows will erect a \$20,000 lodge building.

Contract has been let for a bank building at Mosier.

Portland water service will be extended in Irvington at cost of \$125,000.

The Weinhardt Astoria Hotel will add a fifth story.

Plans have been completed for a \$25,000 high school at Rainier.

Owing to increased labor cost and employers liability laws, cost of sawlogs has been advanced fifty cents to one dollar per thousand.

B. M. Lombard will add two docks at Portland costing \$70,000.

Bids have been taken for a 150-foot steel bridge across the John Day River eight miles above Dayville.

W. M. Penrod will establish a gin-seng industry at Mabery on Mt. Hood line.

The corporation department of the state government for the first year of its existence ending July 30 produced \$310,613. Expenses \$24,436. Commissioner Watson thinks he can handle the business hereafter for \$17,000 a year.

Eugene building permits for July totaled \$190,920, largest for three years in any one month. This included \$100,000 high school.

Peter Loggie, North Bend, is planning a \$45,000 brick apartment.

Contract has been let for the Capital highway in Washington County.

The Corvallis & Eastern is being re-ballasted from Albany to Hoover and there is talk of extension eastward.

During the present year more than 100 new houses will go up in Corvallis.

John Shallinger of North Bend will test the state butter law that provides for only 16- and 32-ounce packages.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. has established an agricultural department in charge of H. E. Cross at Gresham.

Prof. Young of the department of economics of the state university has been in conference with Father O'Hara and other labor leaders to frame a program for the unemployed.

Steel rails for the Willamette Valley Southern are arriving by boat at Portland.

The Public Service Co. of Tillamook is installing a 12,000-gallon oil tank.

Owing to German war, salmon pickling at Astoria has ceased.

Hops are expected to go to 50 cents as a result of the war abroad.

Working men's compensation acts are forcing employers to hire men without families wherever they can do it.

Pendleton has immediate use for 50 new houses.

The steamer Bandon has made the fifth trip out of Toledo with 750,000 feet of lumber.

Railways Have Curtailed Expenses By \$700,000,000.

(From the Rogue River Daily Courier.)

Out of the labyrinth of figures, facts, and near-facts on the question of railway rates, the main points of contention have for weeks been slowly emerging.

President Ripley, of the great Santa Fe system, has with an admirable appearance of candor helped to set forth before the country the point of view of the railway men in an article in the January Atlantic, says Current Literature.

He does not limit himself to the specific question of rates, but endeavors to correct what he feels to be false position in general in which the people have come to regard the railways.

He admits that in the past, up to a "comparatively few years," the public did its duty to the railways better than the railways did their duty to the public.

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
