

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Eugene S. Cothran, of Portland, has been appointed inspector of the geological survey service at a salary of \$1500.

The speech of A. L. Mills, president of the First National bank, made at Portland August 14, was ordered printed by the senate as a public document.

Negotiations are afoot in Harney county for the location of a Mormon colony on lands now owned by the Oregon & Washington Colonization company.

Another epidemic of dog poisoning has broken out in Pendleton and the indignation among dog owners is such that big rewards are being offered for the apprehension of the guilty persons.

That a snake will commit suicide to escape torture was demonstrated at Silver Lake, when two cats, the property of a homesteader near the lake, herded a big diamond rattler into a hill of red ants.

Charging that title to the land was acquired by fraud, the government has started suit through the federal court to cancel patent for 640 acres of land now owned by Stephen Harner, a sheep rancher of Grant county.

Circuit Judge Kelly sentenced Roy Carroll, convicted of killing John Zoller, marshal of Gervais, to life imprisonment in the penitentiary. Carroll's attorneys signified their intention of appealing to the supreme court.

That the European war presents a golden opportunity to Oregon to develop its mineral resources and add millions to the wealth of the state is the belief of C. W. Clapp, a mining man of 30 years' experience, who lately came to Portland from Nevada.

The sale of 87,500,000 board feet of timber in the Crater Lake national forest has been authorized by the forester at Washington, D. C. It is estimated that the sale will bring over \$250,000 into the national treasury, 35 per cent of which will be spent locally on roads and schools.

One mile of fruit, 12 feet high and eight feet wide, weighing 3,000,000 pounds, is the estimated record of the Milton Fruit Growers' union to date this year. This does not include local or express shipments or fruit sold to peddlers. About 14 carloads of prunes are going out daily at the best prices in many years.

Thomas Brunk, of Eola, state representative from Polk county, and a prominent livestock raiser, left Monday to act as judge of livestock at several fairs in Washington and Montana. He will go first to Chehalis, Wash., then to Spokane, and later to Helena, Mont., where he will attend the Montana state fair.

Joe Knowles, the artist-nature man, who has just completed his 30-day primitive man experiment in the Siskiyou forests, 60 miles southwest of Grants Pass, has returned to civilization. The return was celebrated as a gala day in Grants Pass, and practically the entire citizenship turned out to greet Knowles, when he arrived.

Having been put out of the saloon business because of the bad reputation of his place, W. Margulius of Portland says he will open the largest coffee house on the Pacific coast for the purpose of giving men out of work meals for small cost. The coffee house will be in the building formerly occupied by the saloon.

Complaining that the management of several railroad companies in the state allowed passengers during the recent warm spell to remove their shoes, and that the atmosphere of the cars became unbearable, a resident of the state, whose name is withheld, has asked the state railroad commission to issue an order forbidding passengers from indulging in the practice in the future.

The secretary of agriculture advises Senator Chamberlain that the department will not go further in cooperative tuberculosis tests as requested by Patrons of Husbandry of Forest Grove. The department is arranging tests of pure bred cattle throughout the country under signed agreements with owners, believing this plan will be more efficacious than promiscuous tests.

Pomona Grange, which includes every Grange in Douglas county, is planning to hold a "good roads" meeting in Roseburg on Saturday. The program will include addresses by persons well versed in road building, as well as musical numbers and a general discussion. Good roads enthusiasts from all sections of Douglas county will take part in the general discussion, which will be one of the features of the program.

Saturday, September 19, is the date set for the third annual Hood River county Industrial School Fair. Ten industrial clubs have been organized in the various school districts of the county and keen rivalry will exist among the boys for the trip that is offered by the Commercial club to the two boys scoring the highest in any two projects proposed by the state superintendent of instruction. The successful youths will be entertained in Salem by the state fair association.

DAIRY and CREAMERY

MILK IN HOT WEATHER.

Present Methods of Shipping Should Be Changed.

[Prepared by dairy division, United States department of agriculture.]

With the advent of warm weather dairymen again are warned not to hold their milk before shipping it to market. A practice prevalent in some places is to take the morning milk, combine it with the afternoon milk of the same day and ship this combination early the following morning. This means that the morning milk is kept through the heat of the day. When it reaches the consumer, twenty-four hours or more old, the bacteriological count is high. This explains, the department experts say, why milk from dairies in

which all the conditions appear to be excellent is frequently found to be bacteriologically bad.

The remedy recommended by the department is to hold the afternoon milk, properly cooled, through the cooler hours of the night and ship it the next morning with the morning milk, also properly cooled, without mixing the two. It is of course essential to this plan that the train schedules be adapted to it, but it is felt that when the importance of the change is fully recognized this difficulty will be overcome. Such procedure in cooling and handling would materially reduce the possibility of sour milk reaching the markets.

Shippers are also urged by the department to see that the milk is thoroughly cooled as an important step in keeping its bacteriological count low.

SKIMMING THE CREAM.

The Hand Separators More Economical Than Gravity Methods.

Purdue university, Indiana, carried out a systematic series of experiments in order to discover the best possible way of handling milk, not in any one spot, but at dairies scattered all over the Hoosier State. All deep and shallow pan sorts of setting methods were tried out, also many different kinds of separators. The summary follows:

The use of the hand separator in the place of the gravity systems of creaming will effect a saving of \$3.50 to \$7 worth of butter fat from one cow in one year.

With the hand separator a richer cream and a better quality of cream and skim milk can be produced than with the pan systems.

Of the gravity methods the deep setting system is the least objectionable. It produces a more complete separation and a better quality of cream than either the shallow pan or the water dilution system.

Any neglect to clean the separator thoroughly after each separation reduces the skimming efficiency of the machine and lowers the quality of the cream and butter produced. Wash the separator after each separation.

A trembling machine, insufficient speed, sour, curdled, silny or cold milk and overfeeding the separator caused a loss of butter fat in the skim milk amounting to from eight to twelve pounds of butter per cow in one year. Other things being equal, high speed and a small rate of inflow tend to produce a thick cream. Insufficient speed, a trembling machine and a large rate of inflow result in a thinner cream.

Getting Rid of "Star Boarders."

Nearly 900 of Wisconsin's dairy herds, containing in all more than 13,000 cows, are being officially tested this year for the purpose of detecting and eliminating from them all "boarders." Each of these progressive dairymen is a member of one of the twenty-nine cow testing associations which have been organized by the Wisconsin Dairymen's association. It is hoped that by means of the work done by these testers in ridding herds of poor cows and in aiding dairymen in the management of their herds the production of the cows retained will be greatly increased.

Water For Milk Cattle.

Eight gallons of water each day is the average quantity required for a cow, and the milk is about 87 per cent water. In some pastures there is no water obtainable, the cows being supplied with water only at night and in the morning, which compels each cow to drink four gallons at a time in order that she may have the requisite amount. This is not only cruel, but detrimental to the health of the cow.

SECOND BIG SCHOOL RALLY AT CLOSE OF YEAR

A two days' Lane county educational rally will be held at the close of the ensuing school year, upon a much more elaborate plan than that held last spring, according to an announcement made at the close of the meeting of the supervisors held in the office of County Superintendent of Schools E. J. Moore. A two days' celebration was decided upon because experience has proven one day insufficient time in which to hold the spelling contest, install the educational exhibit and properly carry on the various features of a great school rally program without a great deal of confusion.

In the plans for the coming rally special attention is to be paid to the annual Lane county spelling contest in which the champion spellers of the various supervisory districts will participate and to the educational exhibit which is to be planned on a larger scale than last year and which will in all probability be held in the new armory building, provided the structure is ready for occupancy at that time.

The spelling contest, it is stated, will possibly not attract as great an interest among the schools of Lane county as it did last year as the Lane county supervisors have adopted the state standardization card for 1914-1915, and spelling contests in the various schools are not, therefore, among the standardization requirements as was the case for the school year 1913-1914.

Lane county has the largest number of standardized schools of any county in the state and the schools are generally already up to the requirements as set forth by the state standardization card. The action of the state rather than the county in fixing these requirements as heretofore leaves little room for advancement of the Lane county schools in the standardization movement.

The spelling contest this year will be conducted in each supervisory district under the direction of supervisors, until the final contest which will be held in Eugene, May 13 and 14, the dates of the county school rally, which will be under the direction of the superintendent.

For each district contest the county superintendent will prepare a list of words so that all schools in the county will have the same test, but the records of each district will be kept by the supervisors.

The dates of contests in the four supervisory districts are as follows: October 30, December 4, January 22, February 19, March 19 and April 16.

The standard school requirements as prescribed by the state and adopted by the board of supervisors for the ensuing year are as follows:

Flag.—Must be flying, weather permitting.

Schoolhouse.—Properly lighted.

Equipment.—Teacher's desk and chair; desks for pupils properly adapted and placed; suitable blackboards; window shades in good condition.

Heating and Ventilating.—Jacketed stove, properly situated, minimum requirement; window boards or some other approved method of ventilating.

Rooms.—Attractive at all times.

Standard Picture.—One new one, unless three are already in the room, framed.

Grounds.—To be clean, free from paper, etc. At least three features of play apparatus. Walks, if necessary.

Sanitation.—Pure drinking water, either drinking fountain or covered tank and individual drinking cups; individual or family paper towels. Outbuildings at least two good ones, to be sanitary at all times and free from marks.

Teacher.—Must maintain good order at all times, supervise the playground; have her work well prepared; follow state course of study; take at least one educational journal; have program posted in room; keep register in good condition; be neat in attire.

Library.—Good selection of books from state list. Case for the books. Books kept upright in good condition and recorded according to rules specified by Oregon State Library and required by law.

Attendance.—Average 92 per cent for year and not to exceed two per cent in tardiness for the year.

Length of Term.—Not less than eight months of school each year.—Eugene Guard.

DENSE SMOKE HANGS OVER PARCHED COUNTRY

After a week's respite from the heat and smoke which had prevailed for two weeks previous to that time, increased smokiness and a considerably higher temperature resumed their sway again Sunday and the weather has been distinctly unpleasant for several days.

Forest fires on all sides of the city, practically, are being reported. None have reached dangerous proportions as far as is known.

RIDDLE GIVES FREE VENISON BARBECUE

Ten Monster Bucks Roasted For Celebration September 7.

BIG DAY FOR SPORTSMEN

Unique Entertainment Offered by Rod and Gun Club as Annual Event in Douglas County Town—People of State Cordially Invited.

Deer are numerous and grow large and fat in the mountains of Douglas county. Riddle is the gateway to the best deer hunting in the civilized world, and practically every resident is an ardent sportsman. While other cities throughout the state make an annual celebration of roses, strawberries, cherries, rough riding or whatever feature of their resources they wish to impress upon the world, it remained for Riddle, through her strong Rod & Gun Club, to conceive and establish as an annual event, a Free Venison Barbecue, and to make a celebration of features attractive to sportsmen, when monster fat bucks, barbecued to a queen's taste, are served generously and free to all who wish to come and partake, and enjoy a venison feast the like of which is unheard of and practically impossible to duplicate anywhere else.

The date for this year's barbecue, which is the second in history, has been set for Monday, Sept. 7th, which is Labor Day and a legal holiday, and Riddle's Rod & Gun Club and her citizens in general, cordially extend an invitation to everyone to be present and feast on venison, which is free to all.

Besides being unique in respect of the dinner menu, this event is different in other ways. There is no "graft" to it. It is not a money grabbing event. The celebration is for the one day only. There will be nothing for sale on the grounds except probably ice cream, soda, etc., and ammunition for those who wish to participate in the shooting events.

To be brief, the day's program will be about as follows: All day rifle and shotgun shooting, for cash and merchandise prizes, and silver trophy cups. Rifle shooting, 200 yards off-hand, ordinary hunting rifles only. Trap shooting under association rules.

Demonstrations from all big ammunition and firearms firms will be present to do fancy and expert trick shooting.

The "Rainbow" fish distributing car of the State Game & Fish Commission will be at Riddle, open to the inspection of the public.

At midday the venison feast will be spread.

Ten of the biggest bucks the country affords will be barbecued. Besides there will be sliced venison for those who may wish to fry it for themselves over camp fires, and an enormous kettle of famous venison "Mulligan Stew." The club will also provide bread, coffee, pickles, and ice-water. 75-gallon tanks of coffee and ice water will be on tap. The tables will have a length of several hundred feet. In addition to this feast provided by the Gun Club the ladies of the community load the tables down with all the good things known to a Douglas County picnic dinner. It is all free.

There will be prize contests for baking bread in frying pans over camp fires.

Hon. George W. Riddle, pioneer of 1851, son of the first settler near Riddle, will be orator of the day, and will speak on pioneer subjects relating to game, Indians, etc.

In the evening, William L. Finley, state game department biologist, will give a free lecture illustrated by moving pictures and slides of game animals, birds and fishes. During the day he will also make moving pictures of the barbecue events.

Immediately following the lecture a grand ball will be opened, continuing all night. The usual charge will be made for dance tickets.

Round trip fares of one and one-third, have been granted by the Southern Pacific Railway on all its lines. Get a receipt from your ticket agent and have secretary sign certificate on the ground.

The barbecue is to be held in a beautiful cedar grove on the banks of the river at the edge of town. There will be no transportation to pay after reaching Riddle. Your big day of interest and enjoyment is free after you arrive. There may be those who have never eaten venison. They have never been to the Riddle Barbecue. Those who attended last year had the time of their lives. The Riddle Rod & Gun Club and the city bids you come on Monday, September 7, 1914.
