LANE THIRD IN SPENDING ROAD MONEY

Invests More in Ten Years Than Marion County and Half as Much as Multnomah.

Lane County stands third in the amount spent for roads during the ten years from 1903 to 1913. This county spent a few thousands more than Marion, the second county in the state in amount of population and ever half as much as Multnomah, which has about a third of the population of the state. The money spent by the city of Portland did not come out of the county funds.
