News Somewhat Premature.

An item in The Eugene Register yesterday said:

"John Barker and F. C. Hoffman, proprietors of pool halls at Cottage Grove, pleaded guilty in the justice court of that city yesterday to the charges of keeping their halls open for business on Sunday and each was fined \$5 by Justice of the Peace Young. County Attorney Devers was present at the time the men appeared in court."

The name "Hoffman" should have been "Coffman," the men did not plead guilty in justice court on the day stated, they have not been fined \$5 each, and as they did not appear in court it was hardly possible for County Attorney Devers to be present at the time. The statement that the men are proprietors of a pool room seems to be correct.

The men do not deny that their pool room was open on Sunday and that they expect to pay a fine, but they object to news being published before it happens.

Celery should lie at least half an hour in cold water or on ice before serving, in order to be crisp and firm.

To restore crocheted buttons that have lost their shape through much laundrying dip them in cold starch, shape them with the fingers and let them dry. This will make them look like new.

To cut cold mush for frying, take a wet thread and press it down through the mush, holding it as taut as possible. This cuts easily without leaving ragged edges.

Whipping cream: There is often trouble in getting cream to whip properly, but if a few drops of lemon juice are added it will soon become thick. Care must be taken not to add too much, as that would make it curdle.

To Clean Mother-of-Pearl: Mother-of-pearl articles that have become dull and blurred may be restored by cleansing them with pure olive oil, then applying ordinary nail brush and rubbing with chamois.

Grape Marmalade.

Materials—Grapes, sugar. Utensils—Preserving kettle, small kettle, sieve, measuring cup, cooking spoon, jelly glasses.

Directions—Pick over the grapes, wash and remove from the stems. Separate the pulp from the skins, and put the skins in the preserving kettle. In the smaller kettle put the pulp, heat gradually until they boil and the seeds separate from the pulp. Press through a sieve, then add to the skins. Measure the whole amount, add an equal quantity of sugar, bring to a boil and boil slowly for thirty minutes. Put in jelly glasses.

3 eggs, 1 cup sugar, ½ cup butter, ¼ cup tablespoons sour cream, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 cup soda, 1 cup blackberry jam, 1 teaspoon each cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg and allspice, 2 cups flour. Bake in three layers. —MRS. BEN GROFF.
