

GRADING LORANE CUTOFF IS NEARLY COMPLETED

Road, Which Eliminates Only Bad Hill Between Here and Lorane, Can Not Be Used Until Spring.

The work of grading the road around the Hardy Crowe hill at Lorane is about completed, according to Wm. Baimbridge, who was in the city Monday collecting the money donated to the work by Cottage Grove business men. The road will not be opened until next spring, however, as it will be im-possible to put on the rock until then. This cutoff will eliminate the only bad hill between here and Lorane and will make travel between here and there

ONLY SEVEN DAYS REMAIN FOR REGISTRATION

County Clerk Issues Statement.-Those Who Have Not Registered Since January 1 Can Not Vote.

In an endeavor to clear away the confusion which has arisen as a result of changes in the state registration law, County Clerk Stacy Russell has issued a statement giving full information on the subject for the benefit of the voters of the county. He says:

"Any voter who has registered since the first of this year and who has not moved from one precinct to another since that time, does not have to reregister for the general election, but anyone who has moved since registering will have to re-register.

"Those who swore in on primary election day are not registered and will have to register now in order to voce, but anyone who has regularly registered before the registration books closed previous to the primaries is entitled to vote on that registration, provided that he has not moved, as above stated.

"Voters may register before any notary public or justice of the peace." registration books close at 5 o'clock p. m. on Thursday, October 15.

MOSBY CREEK IS SOURCE OF MANY RUMORS

Persistent reports continue to come from the Mosby Creek country that some unusual development is contemplated. One day a report comes of a survey party seen here and the next day a report of a party of surveyors sneaking into the woods at some other point. Other reports have come that options have been taken on certain eces of property.

Despite all the rumors none of them has been traced down to anything definite. Several billion feet of merchantable timber could be reached by a railroad up this valley and, no doubt, one will some day be built for that pur-pose, but no information can be secured that would give encouragement of anything of that sort being planned for the immediate future.

One of the largest lumber companies has immense holdings in that section.

Saw Gathering of Two Armies. After witnessing the mobilization of roops in Montreal and Juarez within wo weeks, Col. Creed C. Hammond, commander of the Oregon coast artil-lery corps, O. N. G., has returned from a 10,000 mile circuit of the United

States.

He was in Quebec on the day when an army of 35,000 Canadian volunteers were mobilized, and he was in Juarez when Villa's denouncement of Carranza was announced, and he saw the operations of the Mexican general in rushing his troops to Chihuahua. This was one of the largest bodies of men assembled in one army during the Mexi-can trouble, according to Col. Ham-mond. Freight and passenger service was stopped on all trains and the rolling stock given to the moving of troops.— **HAMPTON'S**
