### Egg Timbales

Materials—Eggs, six; salt, one teaspoonful; paprika, to taste; grated onion, one-half teaspoonful; milk, one and one-quarter cups; tomato sauce, one cup.

Utensils—Bowl, eggbeater, teaspoon, tablespoon, measuring cup, timbale molds or custard cups.

Directions—Beat the eggs slightly till well mixed, add the milk, grated onion, salt and paprika. Pour into buttered molds or custard cups, set these in a pan of boiling water and bake until as firm as custard. Turn out on a hot platter, stick a tiny sprig of parsley in each one and surround with the hot tomato sauce. Canned tomato soup may be used for the sauce.

When washing saucepans be sure to lay them in front of the fire for five or ten minutes so that they may dry thoroughly inside and so prevent deterioration by rusting.

as dangerous but justified under the conditions in which he had used it. "I have had it brought right home to me as to what suffering the saloons cause. I know what it means to mothers to suffer and to have the fireside desecrated, and while I'm governor no mother is going to suffer if I can prevent it," inferring that if necessary civil law would be set aside for the time being.

The governor told how he had got the state printer flat salary bill through the legislature by means that would have been crooked if used for any but a good purpose, but he thought the end justified the means.

The speaker said that everything he had hoped to accomplish had been accomplished, one of the last of these being the adoption of a uniform accounting system for state and county government, that much had been done to relieve the taxpayer, that he had done the best he could, had been fully paid for what he had done, owed nothing to the state, had nothing coming from the state and was ready to quit and retire to private life.

Cottage Grove was given credit for having furnished one of the best prison superintendents in the United States in the person of Col. Bert Lawson.
