HIGH SCHOOL PASSES 130 IN REGISTRATION

Record of High Mark Confirms Judgment of Those Who Asked for Modern Building.

The registration in the high school has passed 131, the highest record yet made. Such an attendance is in some measure an endorsement of the judgment of those who said a new high school building would result in a largely increased attendance in that department. The attendance this year, despite the fact that a larger class was graduated last year than ever before in the history of the institution, is about 25 higher than it was at this time last year.

Henry V. Allen Dies.

Henry V. Allen, son of Thos. Allen of this city, died at The Dalles yesterday of heart trouble. The funeral will be held here at 1:30 tomorrow from the Methodist Church, Rev. H. N. Aldrich officiating. Interment will be in the Walker cemetery.

Henry Valentine Allen was born at Cloverdale, Lane County, and was 44 years, 2 months and 17 days of age at time of death. He was unmarried. Surviving brother and sisters are: Mrs. John Wallace of this city, Mrs. Rose Golden of Portland, Mrs. Mary S. Schmutz of Seattle, John Allen of this city, George Allen of Mayville, Gilliam County, and Minor Allen of Portland.

Southern Oregon United.

The effort to re-open the Southern Oregon State Normal School at Ashland seems to have secured the quite general support of the counties of Southern Oregon. This fact should help that effort, for the people of the state have too long considered the state's schools as means of passing out "spoils" from the state treasury to the several localities where they are situated.

The school was in operation under biennial appropriations from the legislature for fourteen years. In the session of 1909 the appropriation bill, after passing the house, failed in the senate, and the regents were without authority to continue the school. The plan consists of two main school buildings, women's dormitory, men's dormitory, gymnasium, library, heating plant and considerable equipment—all of this the property of the state of Oregon and free from indebtedness or encumbrance of any kind. The school is under the State Board of Normal School Regents, a board appointed from citizens of counties having no state educational institution, hence its management in the interest of the entire state is assured. No citizen of Jackson county is on the board.

The committee behind this effort, composed of prominent citizens from each of the seven counties of Southern Oregon, emphasizes three points in its argument for the re-establishment of the school.

They point out, first, that a Normal School is not a school of high education, but is for the sole purpose of training teachers in the common schools.

Second, that the state spends over \$5,000,000 annually on its common schools and that, from a standpoint of economy alone, this school should be maintained that the common schools may have trained teachers. In other words, that this \$5,000,000 of taxpayers' money shall be spent through teachers who know their business. The efficiency of our common school teachers should be of prime concern to the citizen. He employs a clever lawyer; he is particular about the doctor he calls in. How much more particular he should be with the ability of the trainer of his children.

President Campbell of the State University says: "There could be no greater extravagance than that of spending large sums of money on public schools which are 'kept' by untrained teachers."

Third, it is pointed out that the history of every state in the Union proves that all Normal Schools (and the same is true to some extent of the colleges) are decidedly local as to their spheres of influence. For instance, the Normal School at Monmouth has only thirteen pupils from the seven counties of Southern Oregon and only thirty-three from the eastern half of the state.

In vain have eastern states undertaken to make one large centrally located Normal School serve all the state. The attendance has come mostly from its immediate neighborhood and the rest of the state has been without the influence of Normal training in its common schools. The result has been that state after state has changed to a policy of taking the school to the people. Oregon is the only state in the Union that ever reduced the number of its Normal Schools. California has eight Normal Schools and 85 per cent of her common school teachers have had Normal training. Oregon has one Normal School. Eighty per cent of last year's applicants for teachers' certificates had no training above the eighth grade.

It is pointed out that the various collateral facts pertaining to a proper location for a Normal School are decidedly favorable in respect to Ashland. Climatically, it cannot be surpassed. The size of the town (6,000) gives the school a local constituency, which furnishes a substantial basis on which to build as well as to maintain a thoroughly efficient training school. Ashland has one of the finest high schools in the state outside of Portland.

The committee wisely makes little ado about the attitude Jackson county has taken toward other educational interests in this state; but it is fair to call attention to the fact that in the Normal School vote of 1910 Jackson county gave the largest county majority for the Normal School at Weston and the second largest (Multnomah only exceeding) for the Monmouth Normal. In 1912 the Agricultural College and U. of O. millage bill received the second largest county majority from Jackson; and in 1908 and 1913 the University of Oregon appropriation bills received their third largest (Multnomah and Lane leading) county majority from Jackson. The vote of other Southern Oregon counties was proportionately as strong. Their people believe in and support state schools.

FADS AND FANCIES

Coffee Parfait.
Materials—Cold coffee, one cup; sugar, one cup; whites of eggs, three; cream, one-half pint; vanilla, one teaspoonful.

Utensils—Ice cream freezer, large spoon, measuring cup, saucepan, egg-beater, bowl, teaspoon.

Directions—Boil the coffee and sugar until it spins a thread. Beat until dry the whites of the eggs. Then pour the boiling syrup over the eggs, stirring all the while. Whip the cream until stiff, add to the coffee and eggs, add the vanilla and pour into the freezer can. Pack in ice and salt for three hours.

Tomato Pie.

This is a dish beloved of the vegetarian. Skin and slice some tomatoes and lay them in a pie dish. Sprinkle

with salt and pepper and add a little white sugar, also a well-beaten egg and half a cup of milk or single cream. When the pie dish is full put a rich layer of paste over and bake in a hot oven.

To preserve fruit jar rubbers cover with dry flour. When wanted for use, wipe off the flour with a dry cloth and the rubbers will be as good as new. Any rubber goods may be preserved for years in this way.

Very good griddle cakes can be made with the odds and ends of stale bread. Break the bread up into small pieces and pour over them just enough milk for the bread to absorb. Soak this over night, and in the morning add an egg, a little flour, baking powder and sufficient milk to give it the proper consistency.

When whipping cream beat slowly for the first two minutes and then very rapidly.

If bacon is soaked in water for a few minutes before frying it will prevent the fat from running.

Save the vinegar left over from pickles. It is better than ordinary vinegar for salad dressing.

Try one teaspoonful of tartar emetic in a saucer of sweetened water to get rid of ants. Set where the ants come, out of reach of children.

A tablespoonful of turpentine boiled with your white clothes will add to the whitening process wonderfully.

To sew edging on the machine, without showing the stitching, turn the edging back on the goods and sew on before you run the hem. This looks just as nice and is much faster than the old way of whipping on by hand.

If your shoe polish becomes hardened do not moisten with water, but with milk.

Gas ovens should be cleaned with warm, soapy water, to which a little ammonia has been added.

The clothes wringer will last twice as long if the pressure screw at the top is loosened after each using.

Carrots should be cut in slices instead of cubes, because the outside part, which is the darkest, is the richest. If cut in slices it is more equally distributed.

Solids spots may be removed from white silk or satin by rubbing them with a fine flannel cloth dipped in a little alcohol or ether.

Never throw away cake, no matter how dry, but the next time you bake a custard slice it on top before putting into the oven. This makes a delicious caramel crust.

While separating the yolks from the whites of eggs, sometimes a speck of the yolk slips into the white. To remove this dip a clean cloth into warm water and wring it dry. Touch the yolk with a point of the cloth, and it will cling to it at once.

Shower Bath Conveniences.

The new nickel mountings for shower baths have swung from them a curtain of white silk rubber, and the seats which are fitted across the bathtubs are covered with white rubber to render them less slippery.

Rubber mats with little protuberances similar to those used on cigar and restaurant counters for change are used in the bottom of the tub and will be gratefully received by those who have known the discomforts of slipping around in a tub rendered slippery by soapsuds.

These mats are about two feet one way and one foot the other and are not expensive. Rubber gloves made on the same principle as the rubber flesh brushes are excellent for opening the pores of the skin. They come in various sizes for men and women.

After Dinner Candies.

For chocolate mints use three cupfuls of granulated sugar, one cupful of hot water and a teaspoonful of cream of tartar. Boil the mixture until it "bairs," remove from the fire and add fifteen drops of peppermint, beat well and drop on glazed paper. Melt four ounces of chocolate over a kettle and drop the mint drops into it one at a time; then place them on paper again to harden.

Cottage Grove made a net gain in population during September of six, there being ten births and four deaths. The complete report of County Health Officer Prentice for the month is as follows:

The births for September were: Blachley—Males, one; Cottage Grove—Males, four; females, six; Coburg—Females, one; Divide—Males, one; females, one; Eugene—Males, eleven; females, nine; Junction City—Males, four; females, one; Florence—Males, one; females, one; Meadowview—Females, one; Marshfield—Females, one; Springfield—Males, one; females, two; Wendling—Males, one. The totals are: Twenty-three sons and twenty-five daughters.

The deaths for the month are: Cottage Grove—Male, age 75, cancer of the bladder; male, age 60, suicide; male, age 75, apoplexy; male, age 36, tumor of the brain.

Elmira—Male, age 2, bowel complaint; male, age 20, accidental death; male, age 75, stomach disease; male, age 11 months, bowel disease; female,

age 16, enteric fever; female, age 87½, senility; female, age 5½, heart disease.

Eugene—Male, age 4 months, bowel complaint; male, age 46, paralysis; male, age 84, fracture of the hip; male, age 45, cancer of the pancreas and liver; male, age 3 years and 11 months, acute mucous enteric colitis; female, age 35, shock after operation; female, age 75, disease of the gall bladder.

Irving—Female, age 26, inflammation of the bowels.

Marion—Male, age 47 days, acute debility.

Mabel—Male, age 3 months, kidney disease.

Joler—Male, age 12, diabetes.

Springfield—Male, age 62, heart disease; male, age 68, heart disease.

Veneta—Male, age 50, liver disease.

Wendling—Male, age 28, accidental death; female, age 2, lung disease.

Walton—Female, age 50, apoplexy.
