

Has Oregon Been Represented? Neighborhood News

DID THE PEOPLE of the First Congressional District of Oregon favor the investigation of the "Money Trust?" Congressman Hawley, their representative, is shown by the Congressional Record not to have voted upon a resolution endowing a subcommittee of Congress with full power to go into every phase of the inquiry.

Did Oregon laboring men favor the passage of a bill advocated by the American Federation of Labor to provide that injunctions should not be issued without giving the parties to be enjoined an opportunity to be heard, unless immediate and irreparable injury was likely to ensue to the complaint? Congressman Hawley, their representative, is shown not to have voted upon roll call for the passage of this measure.

Did the people of Oregon favor the passage of H. R. No. 12812, of the Sixty-second Congress, providing for a reduction in tariff upon manufactures of cotton? Congressman Hawley, their representative, is shown not to have voted.

Were the parents of Oregon children interested in the children's bureau? Did they favor the passage of the bill creating a branch of the department of commerce and labor to investigate upon all the matters pertaining to the welfare of children and child life, especially the questions of infant mortality, the birth rate, orphanage, juvenile courts, desertion, dangerous occupations, accidents and disease of children and providing for the publication of the results of such investigations? Congressman Hawley, their representative, is shown not to have voted when the roll call was taken.

During the Sixty-second Congress did Oregon people desire the passage of a bill to reduce the duties on wool and manufactures of wool? Mr. Hawley, their representative, is shown to have answered "Present."

During the same session of Congress were the people of this state opposed to or in favor of the placing of sugar upon the free list under the provisions of H. R. No. 21213? Mr. Hawley, their representative, is shown to have answered "Present."

Was Oregon concerned about H. R. No. 122195, introduced at the same session, to effect an average reduction of the entire woolen tariff schedule from 59.23 per cent to 31 per cent? Mr. Hawley, their representative, is shown not to have voted for or against this proposal.

With the prospects for increased immigration to the state of Oregon as a result of the opening of the Panama canal were the people of this congressional district concerned about the character of the immigrants from foreign countries who should be permitted to come into the United States? Did Oregon people believe that immigrants over sixteen years of age who could not read some language should be admitted? Did they believe that such a bill should have been passed over President Taft's veto? Mr. Hawley, their representative, is shown not to have voted.

Did Oregon people favor abolishing the commerce court judgments? Mr. Hawley, their representative, is shown not to have voted when his name was called.

These bills represent but a small portion of the measures upon which Mr. Hawley, during the last two sessions of Congress has not voted, presumably for the reason that he has been absent. During the Sixty-second Congress this habit became so chronic that the record shows that the congressman from the First Oregon District, when the Arizona and New Mexico statehood bill was presented, did not care whether the American flag had forty-three stars or forty-five. He is recorded as "not voting."

Mr. Hawley, it is beginning to appear, has reached the end of his string. Seven thousand five hundred dollars a year is too big a salary to pay a man who can not find time to stay on the job. The people of this district can not afford to pay a man such a salary to stay in Washington and attend the ball games or devote his time to the business of an insurance organization. The danger to the district from an unperformed service is even greater than the expense of an overpaid employee. Mr. Hawley has now been on the pay roll at Washington eight years. He asks to be retained two years more. Have the people of this district been represented? Can they re-elect Mr. Hawley upon his record? Should such a congressman be elected solely upon the plea that he is a Republican? It is up to the independent voters of the First Oregon District to decide in November whether this member from Oregon shall be continued in the list of those "not voting" or whether a man will take his place who will attend to business and who will answer "yea" or "nay" when the roll is called.—Eugene Guard.

The statement made by Fruit Inspector Stewart of Cottage Grove during the Punkin Show pertaining to the apples on exhibition as being the best he had seen in the county this fall, means more than one thinks off hand.

Mr. Stewart has visited many of the fruit sections of Lane County and is a man qualified to judge. Junction City raises some good fruit, and this is not

confined solely to apples. But this district could raise a much larger percentage of good fruit if the orchards were looked after and cared for in the manner they should be. This section has never made special effort in the line of fruit production, but by better care and more careful following of instructions as set forth by men of Mr. Stewart's ability, Junction City could make the same name in fruit culture that it has in the dairy industry.

By this we do not mean that all other pursuits of the soil should be abandoned and fruit culture entered into solely. But the fact that we can grow good fruit here is just one more way of proving that this section is adapted to diversified farming.
