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FADS AND FANCIES

If glass is desired on linen add a teaspoonful of salt to the starch when making.

To polish a black marble clock, rub over with olive oil and finish with a clean chamois leather.

When starching holland pinafores, put a little strong tea into the starch. This keeps the garments a good color.
