

Last But Not Least to Voters of Lane County Is X 358 for New County

IN A CONVENTION at Mapleton last March, delegates representing the western part of Lane County met and decided to ask the people to set aside that portion of the county to be known as Siuslaw County. The most unsatisfactory conditions have prevailed until recently in our school advancement; law enforcement has been a farce, and road improvements a joke; in fact, our main traveled road has been nicknamed "Siuslaw Bul-a-void." We have not deserved this—it has not always been intended—but almost every person that has been connected with the administration of county affairs admit the best solution is to establish a county government in touch with the development of the western part of Lane County. Our valuation is \$5,000,000—Our population is 2500—We have more than twice the requirements of the law. This should be sufficient as to the financial success. The boundary line follows the summit of the Coast Mountains until it is necessary to cross the upper Siuslaw where it runs south several miles west of what was the boundary line of the proposed Nesmith County. Give us the benefit of a reasonable and just decision—Let the people of the western part of Lane County have an opportunity to do something for themselves—Do at least this much for us.
