## STOCK DISEASE SPREADS RAPIDLY

Secretary of Agriculture Says Hidden Sources of Infection Are Main Danger.

Washington.—An order quarantining the state of Rhode Island against interstate shipments of livestock was prepared by the department of agriculture for issuance.

Rhode Island is the 11th state to be placed under federal quarantine in the campaign to suppress the epidemic of foot and mouth disease, Massachusetts, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Illinois, Maryland, Michigan, Wisconsin and Iowa, composing the already wide area affected by the disease.

Secretary of Agriculture Houston said this epidemic was "one of the most contagious and destructive diseases of cattle, swine and sheep and exceeded in area affected any of the five previous outbreaks in this country." Unless the infection can be immediately localized and quickly eradicated, he said, it threatened untold losses among livestock.

Veterinary authorities of the United States are agreed that the only method of combatting the disease is to stop all movement of stock and material which have been subjected to any danger of infection and to kill off without delay all herds in which the disease has gained any foothold.

At present the chief danger lies in the possibility of there being concealed sources of infection. Every effort is being made by state and federal authorities, not only to trace suspicious shipments, but to convince farmers of the seriousness of the disease and the extreme ease with which it is communicated and to urge upon them to report at once to state or federal authorities all suspicious cases of sore mouths or lameness.

All Cars Must Be Cleaned.

Des Moines.—All railroads operating in Iowa were ordered to clean and disinfect all empty stock cars now within the state, in an attempt of the commission of animal health to prevent the further spread of foot and mouth disease among cattle.

Regional Banks Will Open.

Washington.—On November 16, the 12 federal reserve banks located by the organization in New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston, St. Louis, Richmond, San Francisco, Cleveland, Kansas City, Minneapolis, Atlanta and Dallas will be established.

At the same time the new reserve requirements for national banks, as prescribed by the law, will become effective, thus releasing, according to Secretary McAdoo, more than \$400,000,000 of reserve money and increasing the credit facilities of the banks of the United States by that amount.

## CALIFORNIA SHAKEN BY EARTHQUAKE

San Francisco.—A week of exceptionally warm, clear weather was followed here Sunday by an almost imperceptible earthquake. Open doors in downtown buildings swung slightly.

The disturbance was felt by the trans-bay region, including Oakland, Alameda and Berkeley, and at San Jose, 50 miles down the peninsula.

According to Professor Charles Burkhalter, in charge of the Chapot Observatory of the University of California, at Berkeley, the disturbance was local in character and was what is known as a "number four" earthquake, which is a minor one.

Los Angeles.—A slow, trembling earthquake shock rattled houses and windows here at about 3:40 P. M. Sunday. It caused several persons to telephone the police that their safes had been blown.

Many persons living in lightly-constructed bungalows described the vibration as rolling and of sufficient force to cause closed doors to spring open and nicely balanced objects to topple over.

Siege of Naco Is Renewed by Villa.

Naco, Ariz.—Three bodies of Governor Maytorena's Villa troops appeared in their former positions, seemingly in fulfillment of the promised renewal of the Naco, Sonora, siege.

Yaqui Indians took up positions to the south and west of Naco, Sonora, and a column of infantry and cavalry joined them on the west.

Secret Wireless Sought.

Washington.—Secretary Daniels, of the navy department, and Acting Secretary Lansing, of the state department, in conference with Assistant Chief Moran, of the secret service, decided to begin a search for secret wireless apparatus alleged to be in use by European belligerents on American territory.

## GUTIERREZ IS IMPRISONED

Telegram Purporting to Be From Carranza Accuses Villa.

New York.—General Eulalio Gutierrez, who was elected president of Mexico at the recent Aguas Calientes convention, has been imprisoned by General Francisco Villa, according to a telegram said to come from General Venustiano Carranza, and made public here by the Mexican bureau of information, the same agency that announced Gutierrez had repudiated the acts of the convention electing him.

The telegram accredited to General Carranza did not say where the new president had been captured or where he was believed to be incarcerated.

The reason for the seizure and confinement of Gutierrez, the message said, was that he had refused to be dominated by the demands of the Villa faction.

El Paso, Tex.—General Carranza's charge as given out at New York that General Eulalio Gutierrez, named provisional president by the Aguas Calientes conference, was not credited by either Carranza or Villa agents here, who had received no official or indirect information of the report.

The Villa agents pointed out that Gutierrez would not have been selected for the post unless he had been willing to occupy it.

Cotton Loan Is Lawful.

Washington.—No violation of the anti-trust laws is threatened by the \$135,000,000 cotton loan fund plan, according to an opinion handed down by Attorney General Gregory at the request of President Wilson.

Montana Is for Suffrage.

Helena, Mont.—Returns from more than 50 per cent of outstanding precincts show the woman suffrage amendment and the farm loan initiative act are the only measures submitted at the election to pass.

## ALLIES ASK JAPAN TO HELP

Free Hand in China Said to be Offered as Inducement.

Pekin.—Inticing offers have been made to Japan by agents of the allies in China to induce the Mikado to throw 200,000 of his seasoned troops into the European scene of war.

Following the fall of Tsing-Tau, which releases Japanese troops and warships and removes any German menace to Japan's prestige in the Orient, the allies are exerting every effort to bring Japan into the western conflict. A guarantee of a freer hand in the affairs of China is said here to be the price offered for the Japanese troops. The younger statesmen are said to have received the proffer with enthusiasm, but the more conservative are dubious.

Boxing Game Over in California.

San Francisco.—The boxing game will shut up shop in California about the first of December. The anti-fight bill, which prohibits all save four-round amateur contests, was carried at the election.

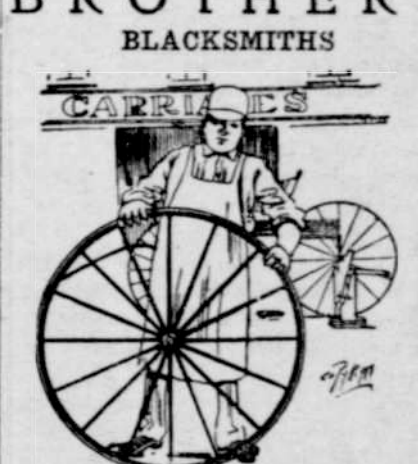
