The daintiness of the lingerie pillowslip grows more apparent each season, and no couch full of satin and velvet cushions is complete without the addition of at least one of these confections.

In shape they are long and narrow, square, heart shaped, diamond shaped, octagonal or star shaped, with and without flounces. They are of fine handkerchief linen, cambric and marquisette. One is decorated with Venetian embroidery, with medallion lace figures and point de venise lace finishing the edges. Another has fillet lace motifs and flowers. Some are done on fine hand woven linen. If initials are used they are not large and are surrounded by the empire wreath.

Owing to the tendency of certain shoe buckles, jeweled or of silver, to catch in chiffon and lace skirts effort was made by their designers to produce something equally as attractive without the objectionable sharp points and edges. The result is the double loop lace shoe bow, particularly remarkable for the delicacy and beauty of the dentelle work, which stands out in clear relief against the density of a black background. These are worn at the side of the instep.

Favorite Recipes by Cottage Grove Women

Christmas Plum Pudding.

Raisins, 1 1/2 lbs. (1/2 chopped); currants, 1 lb.; beef suet, 1 lb.; bread crumbs, 1 lb.; sugar, 1 lb.; citron, 2 oz.; candied lemon peel, 1 oz.; flour, 1 tablespoonful; salt, 1 teaspoonful; blanched almonds, 2 oz.; 1 orange (grated peel and juice); 1 lemon (grated peel and juice); cinnamon, 1 tablespoonful; nutmeg, 1 tablespoonful; cloves, 1 teaspoonful; cream, 1 gill; eggs, 8; wine, 1 glass; brandy, 2 wine glasses with the raisins. Directions for making: Flour, suet, salt, while mixing add fruit to suet, then sugar. Cut almonds lengthwise in 3 or 4 pieces; mix together. This can stand several days if necessary. When ready to cook, add cream and eggs well beaten, wine and brandy. Steam four hours.

Sauce: Cream 1 cup sugar with 1/2 cup butter; when light, add 1 egg well beaten; pinch of salt, 1 large cup of hot cream. Beat all together, place on back of stove until it thickens, but do not allow to boil.
