COLONEL MERCER COMMITS LESE MAJESTE

Planet Saturn Is Used in Manner to Which It Might Object Had It the Power.

The following is a paragraph of a communication from the pen of the versatile Col. Mercer, which appeared in the Sunday Register:

The planet Saturn has a habit—may be it's a weakness—peculiarly its own. Among the whole number of stars that forever look down upon the busy tribes of men there is none other so erratic as Saturn. During the cycle of almost 30 years required to complete its revolution around the sun it has a habit of coming, every once in a while, and looking out from the heavens, blazing its brilliancy upon our world below, and then retiring under a cloud, that when it shall come again its illuminations may be all the more spectacular. President Wilson has a habit—maybe it's just a weakness—peculiarly his own. On the 4th day of April, following his inauguration, he called both houses of Congress together and appeared before them in person—a procedure heretofore unheard of among parliamentary bodies—and delivered his message, supplemented by a stump speech, urging, among other things, the early passage of the present law tariff. From time to time President Wilson has repeated this spectacular performance, especially in the matter of the new banking and currency act, and again in the matter of creating a reserve board, the latter being purely a political proposition providing flat positions for certain political henchmen at enormous salaries. Each of these measures originated in the fertile brain of President Wilson; each of them was in turn carried to a joint session of Congress handmade and ready for ratification, merely on the unblinking assumption that a subservient majority would not hesitate to bend the trucking knee and do his bidding. On each of those occasions he has transgressed all known rules of propriety and parliamentary procedure. On each occasion he has promised congress and the American people immediate and unheard-of prosperity, and on each and every one of these occasions I have clothed myself in sackcloth and ashes and cried aloud, "Holy Mikel! Saturn's been pulling off another stunt at the National Capital."

Half of People Flat Footed.

Are you flat-footed? Five people out of every ten suffer from pes planis or flat foot, states Dr. George H. Marshall, physical director of the Y. M. C. A. It afflicts men and women in every walk of life, especially those who are on their feet most of the time, as store clerks, waiters, mail carriers, policemen and street car men.

Dr. Marshall says that many people who think they are suffering from gout or rheumatism are really only flat-footed and can be relieved by the proper exercise. But instead of resorting to the simple remedy, of rising on one's tip toes about sixteen times several times a day, they resort to medicine which does not reach the root of the trouble and does not improve the condition of the individual. The exercise, he says, contracts the ligaments and muscles on the bottom of the foot and thus strengthens the arch of the foot.

"I have given relief to a great many people by this exercise and in other cases it has worked a permanent cure. The causes of flat foot are due to natural weakness, excessive strain, prolonged standing or walking, carrying heavy weights, improper shoes, or a corpulent condition of the body. If you are suffering from pes planis try the exercise I have suggested.

"This is only one of the many things we are trying to teach the men and boys at the Y. M. C. A. in order that they may be healthy and enjoy life to the fullest extent. As a supplement to the gymnasium work, we are planning to have a series of 'health talks' by specialists after the first of next year, which will be open to every one."

Cheese Pudding.

Materials—Grated cheese, two cups; milk, two cups; eggs, one; salt, one teaspoonful; buttered bread, ten slices.

Utensils—Baking dish, knife, measuring cup, tablespoon, teaspoon, bowl, eggbeater.

Directions—Line a baking dish with slices of buttered bread from which the crusts has been removed. Fill the dish with the beaten egg, salt and grated cheese. Cover with two or three slices cheese. Cover with two or three more slices of the bread, bake for twenty-five minutes. Serve hot.

REMARKABLE PROGRESS IS REPORTED BY ADVENTISTS

Contributions Last Year Reached the Amount of \$23.42 Per Communicant.

Members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church were greatly cheered over the remarkable progress their denomination has made in various ways during the past year as given in a report that has just been received from the statistical secretary of the general conference, the governing body, which has its headquarters in Washington, D. C. There has been a large increase in the membership to the extent of more than eight thousand, a wonderful growth in tithes and offerings, and the movement itself has penetrated into a number of new countries until the heralding of the message telling of the soon coming of the Saviour, which is one of the principal beliefs of the church, is now being sounded in 85 countries.

Funds to the amount of \$2,866,727.40, a per capita of \$23.42 for each communicant, were contributed for evangelistic work in the Seventh-day Adventist denomination during the last fiscal year. The net increase over the amount received for the preceding year was \$161,528.38.

Vital Statistics for October.

Forty-nine births and 26 deaths were recorded with the county health officer during the month of October, according to the report of that official just filed.

The totals are twenty-three males and 26 females.

The deaths for the month, 11 males and 15 females, were as follows:

Cottage Grove: Male, age 86, old age; male, 60, tuberculosis; female, 67, tumor; female, 53, cancer of the bowels; female, 54, dementia.

Eugene: Male, age 64, pernicious anemia; male, 84, obstruction of the bowels; male, 46, kidney diseases; male, one, bowel complaint; female, 41, brain disease; female, 65, tuberculosis; female 18, blood poison; female, 63, peritonitis; female, 24, poison; female, 72, heart disease.

Florence: Male, age 23, drowned; female, 24, tumor; female, 7, accidental death; female, 57, anemia pernicious; female, 51, heart disease.

Hadleyville: Female, age 40, blood poisoning.

Latham: Male, age 60, tuberculosis. Jasper: Male, age 2, brain disease; female, 28, fever.

Springfield: Male, age 59, apoplexy; male, 81, cerebral hemorrhage.
