BRIEF WAR NEWS

The most important development on the European battlefields during the past week was the German movement across Poland toward Warsaw.

At the beginning of the week, General von Hindenburg's strategy seemed confined to pushing a wedge along that part of the Vistula river which runs due east from the German frontier until it bends to the south at Warsaw.

But at the end of the week, it was admitted at Petrograd that in reality another German offensive was in progress. This second movement apparently had crossed Poland unheralded, the first news of its presence being a statement from the Russians that the Germans had failed to pierce the Slav line between Radom and Kielce. Translated from the confusing language of the map this announcement meant that besides moving straight for Warsaw from the west, the Germans were advancing from the south toward Ivangorod, which is a second-class fortress protecting Warsaw's southern flank.

That the Germans are offering stubborn resistance to the Russian advance in East Prussia is apparent. General von Hindenburg, commander of the German troops, and Grand Duke Nicholas, commander-in-chief of the Russians, two of the greatest strategists the war has produced, maneuvered for positions between the Vistula and the Warta, and a big battle is in progress on the Cracow-Czenstochowa line between Russian and Austro-German forces.

Austria's sweep into Serbia has resulted in the victory of Valjevo, which signifies the collapse of the Serbian western offensive. Serbia, during the week, has been compelled to ask Petrograd for help. The appeal comes at an inopportune moment, while Russia is planning a campaign against the Turks and at the same time is being driven across Poland by the masterful von Hindenburg.

The campaign in the west has continued its undecided character throughout the week. In Flanders, there has been a slight exchange of territory, but all the central points along the battle line have been impregnable.

Freezing weather has set in through the length of the battle zone in France and Belgium, the temperature varying between 25 and 28 degrees above zero, Fahrenheit.

The most bitter fighting of the whole battle front was in the region of Verdun and in the Vosges. Here the French troops have been able to record several advances. As illustrating the desperate nature of the fighting in this district the official statement declares that the French have established themselves at certain points within 30 meters (about 100 feet) from the German positions.

French forces have captured the important heights at Ornes near Verdun and silenced two German batteries, according to French official press dispatches.

The Germans, it is evident, have sent their best troops to the eastern front, and even in big guns the allies appear to have the advantage over them. There are no signs, however, of an offensive on a large scale on the part of the allies, who doubtless are as badly in need of rest as their opponents. In fact, it is said that the officers and men who have borne the brunt of the fighting in the trenches are receiving a short leave.

Allies will Purchase \$2,000,000 of Wool. New York.—Agents for the British and French governments announced here they were in the market for 1,350,000 wool sweaters, 600,000 wool stomach bands, 1,600,000 wool gloves and 500,000 pairs of wool socks.

VICTORY IN POLAND RUMORED IN BERLIN

Russian Retreat May Be Cut Off—Petrograd Claims Gains.

Berlin, via Rome.—Apparently no decision has been reached in the great eastern battle, which is being fought in the territory between the Warthe and the Vistula rivers, although Berlin is filled with rumors of a great victory. The official reports continue to register a succession of tactical successes which may form the basis for a decisive victory.

The military critic of Vossische Zeitung considers the Austro-German situation as extraordinarily favorable and declares it gives ground for hope that the Russians may be cut off entirely from a line of retreat. He says that the success which the Germans claim near Czenstochowa is particularly encouraging, as it relieves the situation on the Silesian frontier.

The Austrian reports say that the Carpathian passes are being held strongly against the Russian advance.

London.—The following official report from the Russian general headquarters was issued in Petrograd:

"The fighting between the Vistula and the Warthe continues with great persistence. We have obtained some partial success.

"The fights on the front of Czenstochowa-Cracow have resulted in no essential changes. We have taken 2000 prisoners and some machine guns.

"In Galicia, the Austrians have evacuated Novy Sandez under the pressure of our troops."

De Wet's Sons Surrender.

London.—The Cape Town correspondent of the Reuter Telegram company says that two sons of General Christian De Wet, the rebel leader, have surrendered to a magistrate in Cape Town. Several of General De Wet's chief officers, together with most of his supporters to the west of the railway line, surrendered at the same time.

AUDACIOUS TORPEDOED

German Submarine Attacked Super-

dreadnought, Exploded Magazines.

Washington.—Almost a month after the British superdreadnought Audacious was sunk mysteriously off the Irish coast, the story of her destruction has been made known. She was sunk by a torpedo from a German submarine.

Despite all the mystery that the British admiralty sought to throw around this disaster to one of her newest and greatest ships, the real facts can now be published.

The news was received here from an authoritative source in Berlin.

The Audacious was hit twice and the second blow caused her magazines to explode. This entirely refutes the suggestion that the big battleship was blown up by her own crew "to prevent her becoming a menace to navigation," as was stated some time after the disaster.

Turks Claim Victories.

Berlin.—The Turkish embassy made public here reports of a victory for General Liman von Sanders, the German commander of the Turkish forces near Batum, Asiatic Russia, in which the Turks say they inflicted heavy losses on the enemy.

TURKISH SOLDIERS REACH SUEZ CANAL

London.—Reuter's Constantinople correspondent in a dispatch sent by way of Berlin gives the following official Turkish statement:

"The Turkish troops have reached the Suez Canal. In fighting near El Kantara the British suffered heavy losses and took to flight."

El Kantara is a port on the right bank of the canal about 25 miles south of Port Said.

The Amsterdam correspondent of Reuter's Telegram company says:

"A heavy battle lasting nine hours occurred on November 18 along the Shat-el-Arab river (this river empties into the Persian gulf and forms part of the boundary between the Persian and Turkish dominions) between British and Turkish troops. The British losses were heavy. Captured British soldiers declare that the wounded included the British commander."

"One shot from the Turkish gunboat Marmaris hit a British gunboat and caused an explosion. Details are not yet available."

Canada Adds to Army.

Ottawa, Ont.—Canada will increase immediately to 91,000 the number of men under arms, Premier Borden announced. Fifty thousand are to be mobilized and sent forward as requisitioned by the war office.

GOMPERS IS RE-ELECTED

Federation Refuses to Sanction Fight for Universal Eight-Hour Law.

Philadelphia, Pa.—Samuel Gompers was reelected president of the American Federation of Labor here for the thirty-third time. Though Gompers was not opposed by any other candidate, nearly 100 delegates arose and asked that their votes be recorded against him.

The delegates chose San Francisco for the federation's 1915 convention.

Washington, Oregon and California delegates were disappointed at the refusal of the federation to sanction a fight in those states to establish a legal eight hour day. The following resolution was adopted by a large majority:

"Resolved, That the American Federation of Labor, as in the past, declares that the regulation of wages and hours of labor should be undertaken through trades union activity, and not by legislation, except in so far as the employment of women and children, health and morals, and the employees of the national, state and municipal governments are affected."

Hanging Retained by Arizona Vote.

Phoenix, Ariz.—By a vote of 19,329 to 18,182, the people of Arizona have made themselves responsible for the execution of fifteen condemned murderers. Complete official returns from the recent state-wide vote on a constitutional amendment abolishing capital punishment show the foregoing figures against the measure.

American Cruisers Are Free to Act.

Washington.—Secretary Daniels cabled to Captain Decker, of the cruiser Tennessee, and Captain Oman, of the cruiser North Carolina, in the eastern Mediterranean, giving them discretionary authority to deal with emergencies that might arise in protecting American citizens and interests in Turkey.

TURKEY EXPLAINS FIRING ON LAUNCH

Washington.—Turkey has voluntarily explained to the United States government through Ambassador Morgenthau that the shots fired toward the launch of the American cruiser Tennessee last week were intended merely as the customary warning that the port of Smyrna was mined and closed to navigation.

Although the explanation was informal it was generally admitted at the White House, state and navy departments that all danger of serious complications over the incident had been removed.

Ambassador Morgenthau reported that two members of the Ottoman cabinet, the ministers of interior and war, had fully explained the occurrence to him and high officials here said his message was filed before the instructions sent from Washington to discuss the subject officially with the Grand Vizier could have been received by Mr. Morgenthau.

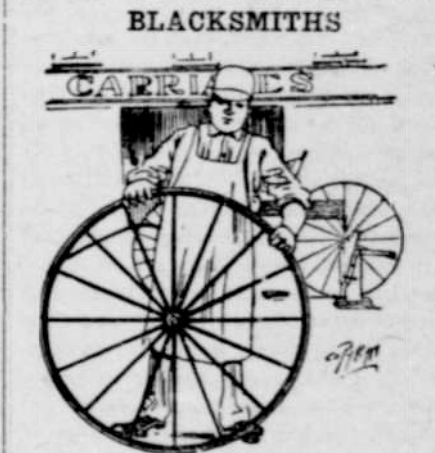
