Sixteen-Year-Old Cottage Grove Boy Delivers Address Before the Ninth Annual Session of Older Boys' Conference at McMinnville.

Cigarettes were said to be even worse than booze as far as a person's physical condition is concerned, in 16-year-old Dan Woods' address before the Ninth Annual Older Boys' Conference at McMinnville Saturday.

Mr. Woods' subject was, "The Best Athletic Ideals" and he quoted a large number of athletic trainers, all of whom were particularly severe in their criticism of the use of tobacco in any form, but especially the cigarette.

Manager Clark Griffith of the Washington American League team was quoted as saying: "There is nothing so ruinous to a man's or boy's physical condition as smoking cigarettes. A confirmed drunkard can live longer and feel better than a cigarette smoker."

The address stated that such great athletes as Connie Mack and nearly all the members of his wonderful team, that such great ball players as Ty Cobb, Sam Crawford, Gene Dube, Louis Venatch, Home Run Baker, Walter Johnson and John McInnes, do not touch tobacco or liquor. Ralph Craig, the Olympic champion was quoted as saying that there was no hope of athletic success for the cigarette fiend and boozier.

Mr. Woods was one of the youngest of those who took part in the program. He was also on the nomination and resolutions committee.

He spoke very highly of the entertainment furnished by McMinnville and the spirit of good fellowship that was developed among the delegates.

Mr. Woods was the only delegate from Cottage Grove.
