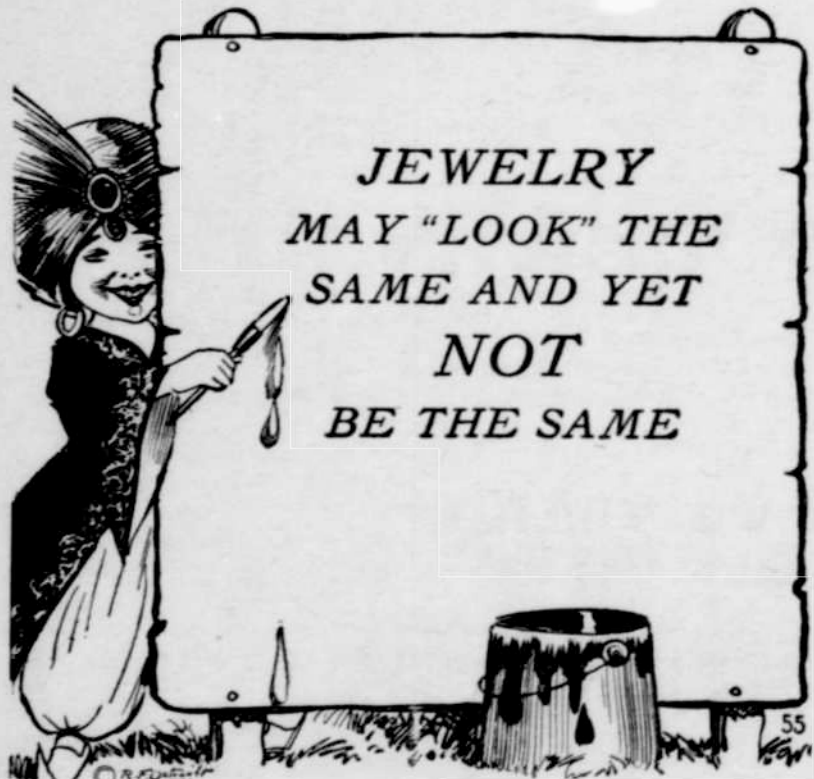

PADS AND FANCIES
There is nothing more useful in the kitchen than a board covered with emery paper. It is splendid for sharpening knives and scissors and useful in removing rust from steel knives and forks. Get a board six inches long, two inches wide and one inch thick. Cover with emery cloth No. 1-0. This puts a smooth edge on carving knives the same as a stone.

Linoleum which has been rolled and put away can be prevented from cracking by placing it for a few minutes in front of a fire before it is unrolled.

To improve the appearance of leather upholstery and to prevent its cracking, mix one part of vinegar and two of boiled linseed oil. Apply this every week with a soft rag, then polish with a piece of old silk or with chamois.

To break in a new pen, wet it for a second before using and it will write as well as an old one.

Keep a quantity of browned flour on hand for making gravy; you will find it saves a great deal of time. Put several spoonfuls on the bottom of a baking pan and stir it over a moderate fire until it becomes an amber brown. Turn it into a bottle and keep for use.

Few housekeepers seem to know that after using all the Dutch cleanser that can be shaken out through the holes, there still remains a considerable amount that never shakes out. Use a can opener and see how much you will find in the bottom of the can.

Instead of adding blueing to water in which lace is to be rinsed, try making the final rinsing in milk; it gives a lovely creamy tone to the lace.

Soiled spots may be removed from white silk or satin by rubbing them with a fine flannel cloth dipped in a little alcohol or ether.

To make soap jelly, so often recommended in the cleaning of delicate things, melt any good laundry soap in water over a hot fire until it becomes liquid. When cold it will form a jelly,

and should be molded in small jars for use at various times when required.

An excellent salad is made of cooked or well-soaked table prunes, the seeds removed and stuffed with nuts. Serve on a lettuce leaf with salad dressing.

A tiny pinch of carbonate of soda or salt added to milk as soon as it arrives will help to preserve it from turning sour.

To remove paint from the window panes, dissolve soda in hot water, wash the glass with it, and in half an hour rub the paint off with a dry cloth.

TESTED RECIPES.

Breaded Mutton Cutlets.

Materials—French chops, cut thin, eight; butter, one tablespoon; flour, four tablespoons; chopped ham, one-half cup; salt, one-half teaspoon; paprika, one-half teaspoon; milk, one cup; lard.

Utensils—Saucepan, broiler, table-spoon, teaspoon, measuring cup, frying basket and kettle.

Directions—Make a white sauce of butter, flour, salt, paprika and milk. When thoroughly cooked add ham, which has been finely chopped; mix thoroughly and set aside to cool. Broil the chops. Season each chop with salt and pepper and cover both sides with a layer of sauce. Allow them to stand on a buttered plate until firm. Dip in egg and crumbs and fry in deep fat until brown. Serve hot with Cuban sauce.

Cuban Sauce.

Materials—Ham, finely chopped, two tablespoons; flour, one-fourth cup; butter, one-fourth cup; stock, one and one-half cups; tomato ketchup, one cup; salt, one-half teaspoon.

Utensils—table-spoon, teaspoon, measuring cup, saucepan, strainer.

Directions—Cook ham and butter until butter is well browned. Add flour, salt, and stock or water, slowly and then the ketchup. Cook 10 minutes. Strain and serve with mutton cutlets.

Huge Tin Soldier at Panama-Pacific Fair.



Young folks who are fortunate enough to be taken to the great Panama-Pacific International exposition to be held at San Francisco next year will see many quaint and curious things. For instance, they see the tallest toys in the world. There is a twelve acre playground called "Toyland Grown Up" in the "Zone," which is a part of the great fun section of the exposition. Little people are sure to be delighted when they see the tin soldier, for he beats anything in the toy line ever before constructed. This imposing warrior is built in imitation of the tin soldiers so common in the nursery, but he is ninety feet tall. Just imagine, if you can, a toy of that great size. The photograph here printed will give you something of an idea of this skyscraping tin soldier.

Shepherdess and Wolf.

The children stand in a long line, one behind the other, holding each one the dress of the player in front of her. The one at the head of the line is shepherdess; her followers are the lambs. One player stands apart from them and is called the wolf. He prowls stealthily around the flock, and the shepherdess calls out, "Who goes round my house this dark and stormy night?" The other answers, "I am a wolf." The shepherdess says, "I beg of you not to hurt my lambs." The wolf then says, "I only want one, and I mean to have this one," and he jumps at the last player in the line.

The shepherdess springs round to save her, followed by all the lambs, holding fast to each other's dress in line. The wolf pretends to jump away, but really tries to catch a lamb. The shepherdess tries to protect the lambs by keeping them behind her and facing the wolf at every turn. If he does succeed in catching one, the shepherdess pays a forfeit. If the lamb can slip from his hold she must run and put herself in front of the shepherdess, who then becomes a lamb, and the escaped lamb is the shepherdess. The wolf in this case loses his place, changing with the last lamb in the line, who becomes wolf.

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U. S. REFUSES TO ACCEPT ITS OWN MONEY

Reserve Bank Returns Gold Coin Which Does Not Weigh Up to the Standard.

That the reserve bank in San Francisco is returning to the national banks in this district all short weight gold coin is the statement of a local banker. It has been found since the establishment of the reserve bank that a great many of the coins have worn down and after being weighed it has been found that they are from a few cents to a dollar or more short. One of the Portland banks has received from the reserve bank \$800 of the coins which were sent recently, all of them returned because of being short weight.

The bankers are asking why does not the reserve bank, instead of sending them back to the national banks from whence they came, turn them over to be reminted, and why does it ask the national banks to make up the shortage?

The reserve bank gives notice that the coins are not full weight, hence short in value, yet no restriction is placed on their being returned to general circulation.

If the coins do not represent full value to the government that minted them, why should they be allowed to continue to circulate in private hands, is another question.

A \$20 gold piece bears the government's stamp "Twenty Dollars." That would appear to be the government's certificate of value to be deemed by the government at the full amount of face. But by the return of the worn coins, without restricting them from continued circulation outside the reserve banks, the moral responsibility

is apparently dodged and the government seems to say that while private individuals may recognize the coins as full value in their transactions the government will not so recognize them. This action upon the part of the federal reserve bank will, more than anything else, have a tendency to cause the use of a great deal more currency than ever before.

NO COMPLAINT AT MEETING OF TAXPAYERS

If Taxes Can Not Be Lowered, Let's Pay With Smile, Says Member of the Committee.

A new type of "taxpayers' meeting" was held in Eugene last week. No one made any complaint, no officer was compelled to defend his record, and no one was called any names. It was a constructive meeting.

A committee was named to study the county budget, soon to be completed, and to make suggestions if any are advisable, or to support the county officials if the budget is found reasonable. This same committee will cooperate with other counties in a comparison of costs and prices in respect to similar work or positions.

This committee was first named to include William Porter, Luke Goodrich, Samuel Roome of Eugene; Welby Stevens of Springfield, and Levi Geer of London. This committee enlarged its number by adding the names of J. D. Hamlin, Walter Griffin, George Gross, E. E. Keppner, Mrs. W. F. Osburn, Mrs. Minnie Washburn, John M. Williams, J. G. Stevenson and T. H. Garrett. Two more will be added, making the total number fifteen. These will divide into three committees of five each which will be assigned to divide the investigation of the county budget into, first, roads and bridges; second, county officers, and third, other items.

"The aim of this committee and of this meeting, as I understand it," said Luke Goodrich, cashier of the First National Bank, who moved the appointment of the committee, "is to give co-operation to the county officers, and create sentiment on the part of the public to work with the officials, rather than to continually nag them for this and that without looking into the real facts."

"If the taxes cannot be lowered, let us pay them with a smile. If they can be lowered, let us help the officials rather than hinder them."
