LONDON

(Special to The Sentinel.)

London, Ore., Jan. 8, 1915. Editor Sentinel: To 450,000 who got away with the bacon was the object of the first mass meeting held here for many years.

Last Friday night at least 25 men gathered in the hall over J. E. Banton's store in the hopes of deciding on some method whereby a stop could be put to petty stealing that has taken place here during the past year.

It seemed that the most recent theft and the one of current interest was that of 150 pounds of bacon, stolen from Sam Shortridge. The thief, it appeared, was determined on whole hog or none, as he raided completely the pork supply of Mr. Shortridge's smoke house. It most likely occurred late at night. The meat was carried first to Mr. O. P. Wills' barn, where assistance was given in the final get-away. The reason for this belief is based on the fact that a side of the hog, at this point slipped from the burglars' fingers and was found half eaten by the early rising dogs the following morning. Also footprints, found near the Shortridge home and on the trail of retreat, gave evidence of the nature of the night prowling.

Similar cases of thievery of a sort too small to warrant Pinkerton detective service in any one case, and yet when taken all together is worthy of grave consideration, gave rise to a meeting of no small amount of excitement. That action should be taken, was the consensus of opinion, but as to method of procedure there was varied expressions. Plans ranging from a still hunt to the immediate issuance of a search warrant were discussed, interspersed by eloquent speeches of indignation. Mr. Levi Geer

CHANGE IN LANE COUNTY LINE PROPOSED

for a distance of eighteen miles just west of London Springs, and Latham. The strip would average less than a mile and a half in width.

From that point west there are minor exchanges, including the giving of a small amount of territory south and east of Alma, or southwest of the Lorane country. No changes are made after the present line reaches the Siuslaw River, which serves as a definite line, and from the point where the line again leaves the Siuslaw river at township 18, range eight west to the west coast of the county.

"I favor it because we have no definite line at present. In some instances we have assumed a line," said Mr. Keeney. "It will be a great aid in the recording of deeds for it will fix a definite line. At present the county faces the expense of having a permanent survey of the southern boundary, and this change will eliminate the need for this."

The following is the proposed southern boundary as agreed upon by the two assessors, and which will probably go into a bill to the present legislature: Beginning at the northeast corner of tp. 24 S. R. 5 E. of the W. M., thence west 30 miles to the Willamette Meridian, north 6 miles to the northeast corner of tp. 24 S. R. 1 W., W. M., west to the northeast corner of tp. 24 S. R. 4 W., W. M., north to the northeast corner of tp. 21 S. R. 4 W., W. M., west to the northeast corner of tp. 21 S. R. 6 W., W. M., north 2 miles, west 6 miles to the township line; thence north to the northeast corner of tp. 20 S. R. 7 W., W. M., west to the northwest corner of said township 20 S. R. 7 W., W. M., north to the northeast corner of Sec. 25 tp. 19 S. R. 8 W., W. M., west 1 mile north 3 miles to the northeast corner of Sec. 11, tp. 19 S. R. 8 W., W. M., thence west to the township line of ranges 8 and 9, thence north to the northeast corner of Sec. 13, tp. 19 S. R. 9 W., W. M., thence west on section line to the northwest corner of Sec. 9, tp. 19 S. R. 10 W., W. M., south 3 miles to the northeast corner of Sec. 29, tp. 19 S. R. 10 W., W. M., thence west 1 mile to the northwest corner of said Sec. 29 south 2 miles to the southeast corner of Sec. 31 tp. 19 S. R. 4 W., W. M., west 1 mile to the southwest corner of Tp. 19 S. R. 10 W., W. M., south 1/2 mile to the east quarter section, corner of Sec. 1, tp. 20 S. R. 11 W., thence west on the half section line to the east coast of the Pacific Ocean.

Douglas county officials have accepted Lane county's correction to the proposed new line between the two counties. In returning the acceptance additional changes have been offered, and these have been accepted by the Lane county officials.

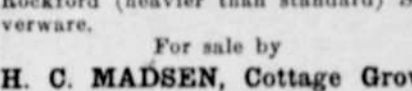
