(From the Hillsboro Independent)

The senate simply showed common sense in passing the bill permitting the industrial welfare commission to deviate from its ruling affecting the women workers in canneries. As one senator put it, "It removes the shackles from the fruit canning industry," and it has taken for granted that the commission will show equal common sense. As The Independent has before pointed out the merits of the question of a short work day for women was not the issue. The proposition was pure and simple that with short hours Oregon canneries could not compete with the canneries in states where hours are not regulated, and, therefore, there were few canneries in Oregon in which the short hours might be enforced. This meant not only that labor willing to work long hours during the short season was denied the employment but lack of means of disposing of fruit and produce has a far-reaching effect on gardening industry.
