At considerable expense in time and money this organization has been brought to its present condition. Practically all the expense has been borne by the members themselves. They have purchased their own instruments and their own music. The organization has given numerous free outdoor entertainments in order to show citizens what they are doing.

At the recent election the band asked for a small maintenance tax. The members felt that they were entitled to some help from the taxpayers. But the tax was voted down.

Did the members of the band get peeved because their efforts were apparently unappreciated? No.

Did they continue practice work? They did. And a few days ago the organization gave a concert and dance in an effort to raise in this way sufficient money to buy uniforms.

A person who has never amounted to anything will eventually be called upon to take the leading role in one event—his own funeral.

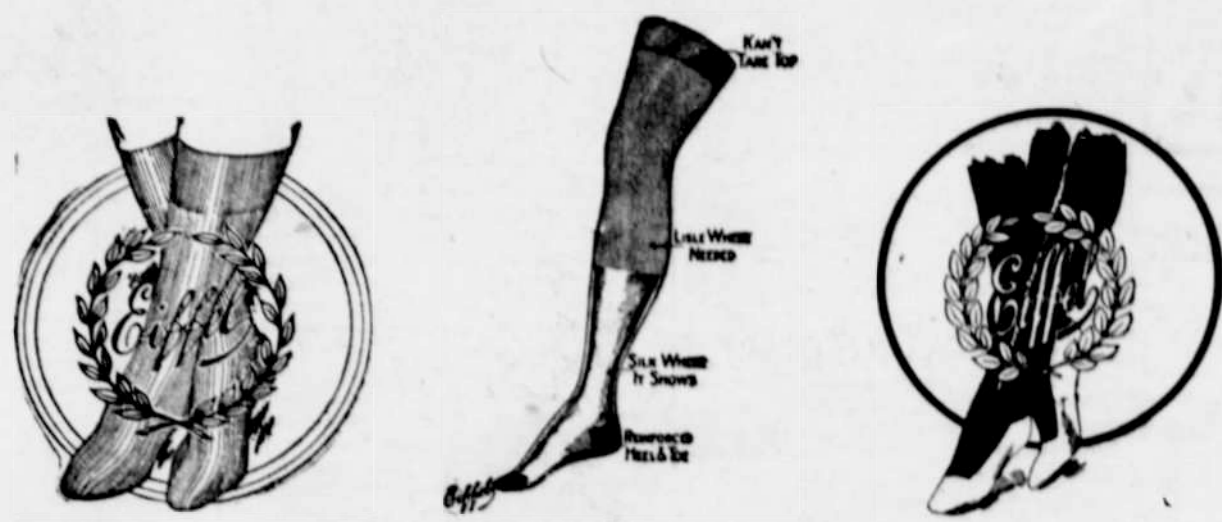
