The evidence before the grand jury was not sufficient to warrant prosecution.

Allen Neff Battles Dies.

Allen Neff Battles died at 11 o'clock Monday forenoon at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. C. Johnson. Cause of death was bronchial trouble, from which he had suffered about a year. The funeral was held this forenoon from the Mills chapel, Rev. H. N. Aldrich officiating.

Mr. Battles was born in Iowa March 16, 1829, and was 76 years of age at the time of his death. He moved with his parents to Vermont while a child. He married Miss Mary Jane Sumner and returned to Iowa. From there he moved to Oregon, arriving here twelve years ago. His wife died a year ago. Seven daughters were born of the union, five surviving. They are Mrs. H. H. Fieser and Mrs. W. C. Johnson of this city, Mrs. Arthur Dyke of Seattle, Mrs. Geo. Wolfe of Westwood, Calif., Mrs. Myrtle DuBois of Seattle. Nineteen grand children survive.

City Only Liable for \$100.

The supreme court has ordered a new trial in the case of Josie Pullen against the City of Eugene, and, according to the attorneys representing the city, the decision amounts to a victory for the city. It is considered an important victory, for it is said to mean that the city of Eugene cannot be held liable for damages greater than \$100 for injuries received on defective sidewalks.

The supreme court sustains the validity of Section 116 of the Charter of the City of Eugene and holds that if damages in excess of \$100 are collectible, they must be collected only from negligent officers.
