SOMETHING TO TAKE HOME.

THE calendars of a certain insurance company are prominently displayed around the state. The company advertises that the stock is owned by Oregon men and that its money is invested in Oregon property. The biggest display line says, "Keep Your Money in Oregon." A very reasonable and proper appeal. If all insurance purchased by Oregonians was placed with Oregon companies, quite a big business would be built up in the state and the people buying insurance would receive other direct benefits besides insurance protection. What is true of insurance is true of all other things, so we were struck by a small line at the bottom of the calendar which gave the information that the advertising and calendar were designed and produced by a St. Louis, Mo., advertising agency.

This shows the inconsistency of a great many people. This insurance company used the "trade-at-home" slogan to appeal for business for itself, but it overlooked the fact that if all the printing purchased in Oregon were given to Oregon printing offices that there would be a great many more people here to buy insurance.

Not long ago at a meeting of the Lane County Horticultural Society the president of the society made the assertion that Lane County products and manufactures were not being patronized by Lane County people. He stated that this was true of the products of the Eugene Fruit Growers' Association. Here again is inconsistency. We make a big whoop and hurrah about building up a market for the products of our farms. Then we ourselves buy the products of farms of other states and depend upon other states to take our products.

Complaint made concerning the products of the Eugene Fruit Growers' Association is probably equally true about the products of the Cottage Grove Cannery. The manager of the cannery made the statement that not a sale of the products of the cannery had been made direct to Cottage Grove merchants, although some of the goods shipped to Portland had probably come back here.

The farmer hollers because the merchants of his home town sometimes buy outside products that could be bought from him. Then some of these very farmers send away for things that could have been bought just as cheaply at home. If all the goods purchased in the Cottage Grove country were bought of Cottage Grove merchants there would be a larger city here with better markets and better stocks of goods and the price of farm land would advance accordingly.

The merchant does not think it fair for others to send away for things that could be bought just as cheap, or nearly as cheap, from merchants who are paying taxes and building schools and roads for the benefit of patrons of mail-order houses and then some of these very merchants, just to save a few pennies, will send away for things which some other merchant stocks and pays taxes on.

The newspaper hollers for home trade louder than any of them, yet half the newspapers of Oregon are printed on paper that is made in the East.

Consistency, thy name is mud!

What we need is a thoroughly organized state-wide trade-at-home movement with a trade-at-home society in every community and hamlet—and the first and greatest tenet of the order should be that the "Keep-Your-Money-in-Oregon" slogan is just as good for one as the other.

ONLY A LITTLE THING.

OF course the little lad had no idea of injuring anyone. He probably is a sweet and tender-hearted little fellow. If he thought about it at all he thought that when he left his tricycle along the edge of the sidewalk it was out of harm's way and out of the way of harming anyone else. WHERE'S THE EXCUSE.

AN interesting document has been issued by the Bureau of Crop Estimates, which gives a comparative statement of the amount of grain on the farms March 1, 1915, and on the same date last year and the average on the farms at that date for the past four years. The following table gives the report in detail:

Wheat: On farms March 1, 1915... 153,000,000
On farms March 1, 1914... 151,809,000
Average (1910-14) 150,647,000

Corn: On farms March 1, 1915... 911,000,000
On farms March 1, 1914... 866,392,000
Average (1910-14) 1,036,611,000

Oats: On farms March 1, 1915... 379,000,000
On farms March 1, 1914... 419,476,000
Average (1910-14) 424,355,000

Barley: On farms March 1, 1915... 42,900,000
On farms March 1, 1914... 44,126,000
Average (1910-14) 41,454,000

In the light of these figures what is the excuse for the present high price of wheat and flour? The supply of wheat on the farms this year is more than a million bushels greater this year than last year. There is actually forty-five million bushels more corn on the farms this year than last. What is the excuse for the advance in the price of corn?

Of grain there is more than enough to last past the next harvest. Why then this upward tendency? It appears to us that the ultimate consumer is getting fleeced again to the profit of the grain speculator.

Remember that this is the year that we are going to have company. Let the visitor go away with an impression of pretty lawns and bowers of roses and other fragrant posies.

Oregon may be the "rose" state—and that is one trouble with it, we speak too much in past tenses.
