Mail Will Be Weighed.

For fifteen days after April 1 every incoming and outgoing piece of parcel post mail at the Cottage Grove postoffice will be weighed and counted and for a month after April 1 all rural mail, coming and going, will be counted. This is done twice each year, the orders having been received for the spring count this week.

In the parcel post mail a record of every package in the different zones will be kept and this together with the record of the rural mail will keep the office force pretty busy during that period.

At the end of the time set to count and weigh the mail the data will be collected by the postmaster and forwarded to Washington to be placed on record as statistics.

Saloonkeepers Sue Lawson.

Whether or not a militiaman can be held personally responsible for damages for confiscating property under orders will be decided in a suit just filed by two Baker, Ore., saloon men against Colonel B. K. Lawson, of the Oregon National Guard, a private and ex-Governor West, asking damages resulting from the seizure of Copperfield, Ore., raid last April. As commander-in-chief of the Oregon National Guard, Governor West ordered the raid. The saloon men now ask \$8000 damages from the men who carried out the orders of the governor.

Twilight League Elects.

At the meeting of members of the Twilight League last night a permanent organization was effected with G. W. Marksbury as president, R. E. Short as vice-president and Worth Harvey as secretary-treasurer. The president was authorized to call a meeting of the merchants of the city to arrange a suitable closing hour.
