Crater Within Crater.

Within the crater of Mount Mazama in Oregon is a subcrater which forms an island in the midst of what is known as Crater Lake. This lake is surrounded by the high volcanic rim of the mountain, the water filling in the opening which once spouted lava and devastated the surrounding territory. Wizard Island, the subcrater, has long puzzled scientists. It is heavily wooded and the crater within, which rises 800 feet above the level of the lake, is filled with snow the year round. How deep it is has never been ascertained. The lake around the inside crater is about 2,000 feet

deep, with wonderfully clear water. The mountain is in the center of the national park which was recently set aside.
