Auto Owners Using Old License Tags.

Although it has been over three months since 1914 license tags were supposed to be replaced with new numbers, many car owners are taking chances of arrest by using the old plates. A fine of \$50 or imprisonment in the county jail, not less than 25 days is attached to the law for the first offense. A reasonable length of time, 30 days in Portland for instance, is given owners in which to secure new tags, but all limits are now passed and violators of the law may be arrested if they appear on the streets with the 1914 number.
