HOW ABOUT YOUR GIRL?

BUT A FEW days ago a news item from a big city told the sad story of a little mother who had been deserted months before by the father of her new-born babe.

She was far too young for a mother. She was still in short dresses. She was not prepared to become a mother. She wept for her own mother, whose name she would not give, for there was no wedding ring on her finger. There was no wardrobe for the unwelcome little stranger. There was no milk in Nature's fount for the little babe, for the mother had been starved for weeks after losing her position on account of her condition. How she had borne up and maintained sufficient strength to keep the child alive until its birth was a mystery.

Here is the little mother's story: She lived in a little country town. Her parents were moderately well-to-do. They took good care of her so far as clothes and food were concerned. She was happy and contented and was about to graduate from high school. On her way home from school she passed the postoffice and depot. At both places she stopped to talk with her acquaintances. At both places she got acquainted with young men. As time went on mild friendships developed. When her mother questioned her as to her delay in coming home from school she whined to be allowed to do as other girls do. The father said: "Oh, no harm can come to her in broad daylight." But he didn't demand to be introduced to those young men whose company his daughter was being thrown into. The mother didn't demand that they come to the girl's home to meet her.

One evening the girl went to an entertainment. One of these young men met her on the way home. She could hardly refuse to allow him to walk home with her. They stopped at a park to sit down and talk a few minutes. Soon his arm was about her. She allowed him to kiss her. She attempted to stop there, but she thought she loved him, she was certain he loved her, she was too inexperienced to judge between animal passion and passionate love, he promised to marry her afterward—she yielded—and now where is the man who swore to marry her and by naive excuse kept postponing the promised day? He took her to a strange city and there deserted her. He was a roving railroad man, she said. He had travelled over much of the world. Most likely this was not the first girl to fall his prey. His greedy passion is not yet satisfied. Perhaps some other little girl in some other little town imagines she loves him now—perhaps she imagines he loves her. Perhaps she, too, will be his plaything for a few months.

Perhaps this human vulture, or another like him, is in Cottage Grove. Have you a girl that might become prey for such as he?

AS WE READ this sad story of this little girl, the same thoughts whirled through our mind as have probably whirled through your mind as we have repeated the story.

An hour or so later we passed the Cottage Grove depot. There was a little girl, not over 18 years of age, leaning against the depot. She is a sweet little miss of good parents. Her face is familiar to us. Three men, strangers to us, but from their appearance railroad

men, were talking to her. She drooped her head as they handed her and smirked upon her. As the head was drooped she could not see the lust in their eyes. True, it was broad daylight, but this little girl was in grave danger. Her cheeks were rosy. May the color never fade from them as it did from the cheeks of the other little girl to whom we have referred.

This little girl is the sunshine of some Cottage Grove home. She has parents who would have been shocked to have found her in the situation we have described. Perhaps it was not your little girl. We hope not. The parents of this little girl, if they read this, will think it couldn't have been their girl. But she is somebody's girl. Are you certain she isn't yours? Where was your girl between 4:00 and 5:00 p. m. every day of the past week? Are you certain that you know?

COTTAGE GROVE'S depot is not different from the depot of any other city. Go where you will, you will find certain young girls that go to meet the trains. There they meet young men that wouldn't dare go to the homes of the girls.

The Southern Pacific boasts that it never has a wreck in which passengers are killed. But the officials probably wouldn't boast that no lives of young women have been wrecked through associations developed at its depots. No railroad would make such a boast.

In such cases it is the parents that must put up the block signal. It is the parents that must teach "safety first." Just as long as parents don't know where their girls are, a lot of them are going to be associating with men that wouldn't be admitted into the home.

If every young man and every young woman had parents who kept them in proper company, "Where Is My Wandering Boy Tonight" would never have been written.

To talk about the United States going to war does sound foolish, when you come to think it over seriously. By the time we could prepare to fight any of the nations now at war, we would have forgotten what it was all about. To think of any of the nations now at war coming to attack this country is also entirely out of reason. We can sever friendly relations and furnish money to the warring nations, but we are further from real war right now than we have ever been—that is, with steady hands guiding the ship of state.

ROAD TAXES.

THE CONSTRUCTION of roads is one of the most important problems Oregon has to deal with. Oregon roads must be such as will stand continued rains and are, therefore, expensive to construct. Shaping up the roads and providing proper drainage will not do for Oregon roads what it will for roads in other states.

To construct roads that will stand several months of wet weather every year costs money. There is only one way to get money for that purpose. That is through taxation. Bonds may be issued, but that is only postponing taxation.

The County Court may levy a general road tax or the road districts may levy special road taxes or the County Court may appropriate money from the general fund.

The County Court may divert 50 per cent of the general road tax to other districts from those in which it is levied. That raised by special tax may be expended only in the district in which it is raised.

Some road districts do not vote a special tax, hoping to get enough out of the general tax to keep up their roads. Where the tax raised for the general levy is sufficient for the purpose, that is all right, but if funds raised in other districts would have to be taken, that would not be fair. The district which expects more than its share would not willingly let some other district get part of the first district's money.

It is only fair that the money raised in one district should be used exclusively in that district. If the funds raised in that district are not sufficient, it is only fair that it should go without

roads. The present County Court is wisely following this policy and when visited a short time ago by a committee from Cottage Grove it enunciated the policy of giving each district only what is justly due it, and all of that. This means that each road district must raise its own funds, which is only fair. Road districts that desire good roads will, therefore, prepare to tax themselves sufficient to fix their own roads, and will have the kind of roads that they are willing to pay for.

Cottage Grove theaters would have larger audiences—and more pleased ones—if they would see to it that the boys in the front rows and in the galleries desist from annoying grownups with unnecessary noise. Parents, when present, could help along this line. Proprietors of theaters could get some valuable information by inquiring of patrons as to whether or not there is reason for this suggestion.

As a compliment to the newspapers of the state, as an appreciation of worthy service to the party, and to secure the best man for the job, Editor F. M. Brown of Brownsville, should be appointed the next Game Warden. It is also time that that part of the state outside of Portland be considered.
