W. C. T. U. HOLDS SESSION HERE YESTERDAY

The Lane County W. C. T. U. held an interesting convention here yesterday, there being forenoon, afternoon and evening sessions. A number of papers were given on subjects correlated with the W. C. T. U. work. The most interesting address was by Mrs. Bearby on "Our Duty as Citizens in the Use of the Ballot." Mrs. Bearby is 73 years of age but is as bright and spry as a woman of 50. She is one of the surviving crusaders who started the prohibition movement to fight against the saloon. She conducted the devotional services in the evening, using the same testament that she used in the crusade. Prof. A. L. Zacharias gave a fine talk on training the child in the schools for prohibition. Other addresses were by Mrs. Hannan, representative of the state president, Mrs. Henry Campbell, Rev. D. A. MacLeod, Mrs. L. A. DeSpain, Mrs. Cora Compton, Mrs. Alta King, Mrs. Ella Humbert.

There was a special musical program at the evening session with vocal solos by Mrs. Leon Des Larzes, Miss Leah Perkins and Mrs. Bert Lawson and vocal numbers by a male quartet composed of Messrs. Aldrich, Umphrey, Mackin and Richmond.

There were delegates present from Eugene, Creswell, Dorena and Cottage Grove.

A peculiar coincidence of the session

was that unwittingly the county president, Mrs. K. B. Woods of this city, had set the date on the forty-eighth anniversary of her birth. The delegates learned of this and in appreciation of her untiring efforts for the society presented her with a fountain pen, a traveling writing pad and a bouquet of white roses tied with white ribbon.
