Sutcliffe Winning Laurels.

The Bakersfield (Calif.) paper has the following to say of Robert Sutcliffe's appearance at the chautauqua there:

"Sutcliffe Day at the chautauqua proved a delight to the admirers of Robert Sutcliffe, who has talked daily to the morning enthusiasts who congregate each morning to hear the inspiring lectures on the little classics which have been reprinted and marked Sutcliffe's Classics. He spoke yesterday morning on Stevenson's 'A Task,' illuminating the familiar quotation with his own interpretation of the simpler, sweeter things of life that combine to make the bonds of brotherhood stronger and finer. In fact the group of two hundred or more who have heard the entire series of Sutcliffe's talks is as one in the expression of enthusiastic admiration for the utter charm and helpfulness of the message that he leaves in the reading of the bits of

literature that stand out in the century's production as being best known. Throughout his talks Sutcliffe evidences his love for the gems of literature and his easy familiarity with them, adding the viewpoint of a scholar to that of a lover.

"Yesterday afternoon he read Edmund Vance Cook's 'How Did You Die?' to an audience of perhaps five hundred. The other classics he has used are 'My Symphony,' by William Henry Channing; 'The Footpath to Peace,' by Henry Van Dyke; and 'Contentment,' by David Swing. This morning he will read 'If,' by Kipling. "In the tent yesterday morning when a number of the best known club women were discussing Chautauqua Week and plans for next season, one said: 'When I put down my favorite attractions, I am going to write Sutcliffe's name three times. He has seemed to me the best thing of the entire week.' And the circle agreed."

Little Boy Drowned at Eugene.
