Base Ball Game Played Last Evening Is Featured by Heavy Hitting on Both Sides.

The game was played on the local grounds and was featured by heavy hitting and ragged fielding by both sides. Medley, who was on third base for the "Stars," played a brilliant game and was easily the star performer of the evening.

The Lorane boys, who seemed hopelessly out of the running up to the eighth

inning, came through with a batting rally that swept the "Stars" completely off their feet and netted them eleven runs in two innings. The batteries were: Lorane, Davis and Crowe; Cottage Grove, Mackin and Glass. Score: Cottage Grove "All Stars," 12; Lorane, 15.

Lotteries Ordered Out.

All the gum-vending machines and lottery boards in this city have been ordered taken out by J. M. Devers, district attorney. Mr. Devers was in the city Monday night to investigate an alleged criminal case, and while here found four of the nickel-in-the-slot gum-vending machines in operation and five places where the punch lottery boards were being used. The proprietors of the cigar stores and other places of business where these schemes were carried on were asked to discontinue their use and the request was complied with.

All lottery boards used in Eugene were abolished some time ago, and the gum-vending machines were taken out only a few days ago. It has been decided by the officers that both of these schemes are covered by the law, which prohibits lotteries and gambling devices.

New Train Put on Yesterday.

The new Southern Pacific fast overland train between Portland and San Francisco was put on yesterday and will be permanent during the exposition season. Northbound the train leaves here at 3:10 a. m. Southbound it leaves here at 5:55 p. m. The southbound train will consist of through coaches, a diner, tourist and standard sleeping cars while the northbound train will have in addition the observation standard sleeper now carried by No. 14 which arrives in Eugene at 5:25.

Militiamen Are Promoted.

The resignation of Major George F. Willoughby and Major J. C. Johnson, caused the following promotions sent last week by Colonel Creed C. Hammond to the Governor for confirmation: Captain W. G. White to major; Captain W. L. Copperroll to major; First Lieutenant M. B. Huntley to captain of the Third Company, coast artillery corps; First Lieutenant W. G. Train Scorched by Fire.

Southern Pacific train No. 15 arrived one morning last week badly scorched by fire. It had run the gauntlet of flames along the water front at Portland where five blocks of mills and warehouses were burning, after being delayed more than three hours. The heat was intense, sufficient to break windows in the train. The passengers and trainmen say that the flames were rising to a height of more than 150 feet.

All the members of the Lane County Educational Board, whose offices expired last week, were reappointed by the county superintendent. The members are: Oliver Veatch of Cottage Grove, W. C.
