**Pear Blight Found Near Monroe.**

C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector, who was in the city from Cottage Grove Friday, says a report has reached him that pear blight has been found near Monroe, in Benton county. He received a letter to that effect from C. A. Park, state horticultural commissioner. Professor Jackson, of the O. A. C., says there can be no mistake about it.

**Oats Seven Feet High.**

Corvallis Gazette-Times.—M. C. Burt, who lives out on the old Haskins place, has a two-acre field of oats, the stalks of which measure seven feet, three inches after being cut clear of the ground. An average sized man is completely hidden from view after penetrating the stand only a few feet and Mr. Burt says he can hardly reach the heads by standing on tiptoe. Every head is completely out, and the entire field presents a sight which it is well worth going a long distance to see.

**Grocers and Butchers Come Under Workmen's Compensation.**

The state industrial accident commission has recently decided to accept the opinion handed down by the attorney general to the effect that meat markets, grocery stores and others using power driven sausage grinders, power driven coffee grinders, etc., are subject to the amendments passed by the general assembly the first of the year. None of these amendments has as yet been tested in the courts.
