When I was young, old people told me the way to break a hen from eating was to put her in a pen and starve her but I find a better way is to feed her all she can eat and her comb will turn red and instead of setting she will lay eggs. I bought 100 White Leghorn hens of a well known chicken raiser. They weighed less than 3 lbs. each when I bought them. In less than 3 weeks they weighed nearly 4 lbs. and were laying 75 per cent. They needed the last half of the feed. If your hens don't lay eggs I will sell you the feed, and then if they don't lay I will sell you more feed.
