FENWICK WOULD HAVE OUR GOVERNMENT DIRECT SALES

Representative Says Selling of Grant Lands at Value by United States and Apportioning Profits Only Way to Keep Out Speculator.

That the railroad lands involved in the government's forfeiture suit, in which lands the railroad had an equity under the recent supreme court ruling, should be taken in charge by a federal commission and sold to settlers and millmen, is the belief of Representative M. Fenwick of Springfield, in a letter just sent Governor Withycombe. Mr. Fenwick writes:

"In response to yours of July 3, asking the opinion of the several representatives comprising the Oregon legislature, I beg leave to make the following suggestions:

"That the general government should take charge of the railroad land and sell it to settlers and lumbermen. The timber lands to be sold in quantities of not less than forty acres, nor more than five sections, to any one individual or corporation. Mill men should be allowed to purchase to this amount for the reason that before erecting costly machinery, they must know that raw material is on hand and obtainable in sufficient quantities to keep the machinery so built, in operation for a lapse of time sufficient to insure a profitable business, and thus encourage the general business of the country by building up and maintaining permanent payrolls, which, by the way, is the life blood of prosperity—from the humblest lot of the poor man to the towering mansion of the millionaire. Should those lands be sold at their actual cash value, they would pass into the hands of bona fide settlers and those wishing to embark in the milling business, for the reason that speculators are always looking for investments in snags and not real cash values.

"The mill men in Western and Southern Oregon within the limits of the land grant have always up to this date been seriously handicapped by being unable to purchase the odd sections—all this useless expense falling on the laborer in the form of decreased wages.

"The farming or agricultural lands should not be sold in quantities to exceed 160 acres.

"I would further suggest that, after the railroad had been paid to the value of its ownership in the land, and all legitimate expenses incurred by the government in making said sales, the remaining portion of said money be divided in four equal parts—one-fourth to be paid to the irrevocable school fund of the state; one-fourth to be paid to the state irrigation fund; one-fourth to the state road fund; and one-fourth to the county in which the land is located, the same to be used for road and school purposes only.

"I would further suggest that it would only be right and equitable, where the railroad company has built mills and had them in operation, and said mills were shut down by the government when it started the suit for cancellation of the grant, the company should be allowed to buy timber on the same footing as any other individual, corporation, and thus start their mills to operating as soon as possible, as idle machinery never fills the dinner pails of the working people, nor brings trade to the merchant.

197 Are Injured During Week.

During the week ending July 22 there were reported to the State Industrial Accident Commission 197 accidents, of which two were fatal. In addition to this, one death resulted from an accident occurring on May 22.

Of the total reported 93 were subject to the Workmen's Compensation Act; 86 were from public utility corporations; 12 from firms and corporations who have rejected the provisions of the act and six from other firms and corporations who do not employ labor in hazardous occupations.

The following shows the number of accidents by industry: Railroad passengers 50, railroad operation 31, saw mills 30, construction 23, logging 20, iron works 6, department stores 6, paper mills 5, milling 3, longshoring 3, meat packers 2, dredging 2, rock quarries 2, mining 2, can manufacturing 2. The following one each: Sailor, expressman, house worker, wood yard, creamery, railroad trestler, woolen mill, telephone operator, ice cream manufacturing, auto works.

All Oregon Week.

August 9 to 16 inclusive is to be "All Oregon Week" at the Oregon building, with exercises extraordinary on the 9th and special days continuing through the week. Everything possible to bring Oregon to the attention of the Exposition crowds will be attempted during this season of activity. All sorts of plans are under consideration and it is certain a magnificent week's program will be worked out. It is expected that several Oregon bands and marching organizations will be there at that time and that many of Oregon's distinguished citizens will be present to participate in one way or another. An orchestra and vocalists will furnish music each day and at night there will be dances and special programs. Eastern Oregon will have one day all its own and in all probability Representatives Lackey and McCully will give away sacks of popcorn as souvenirs of the occasion.

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BANK GIVES MILK TESTERS TO GRANGES

Only Condition Is That They Will Be Used After Being Obtained.—First National of Eugene Is Donor.

With the belief that anything which tends to help the farmer in carrying on his operations in an efficient manner is a benefit to the community as a whole, and makes for bigger deposits in the banks of the country, the First National Bank of Eugene has decided to give to every grange so desiring a Babcock milk tester. The only condition attached to giving the tester is that the grange shall signify a willingness to have it, and secondly, that they will use it after obtaining it.

R. B. Cogdon, county agriculturist, has been doing a great deal of work among the farmers since he came here in an effort to induce them to increase the efficiency of their dairy herds. It is a known fact that a great many cows are simply boarders, that they do not turn out enough butter fat to make it pay to keep them. It is for the purpose of pointing out to the farmer the cow in his herd that does not produce her share that the testers are being put out.

Because of the ideal conditions here for the proper handling of cows, dairy men in the valley have an opportunity to make money. By finding out the milk value of each cow and determining whether or not she pays is one of the great things that has been worked for by representatives of the Oregon Agricultural College and others. The bank is also considering the advisability of placing the testers in schools where there are none now.—Register.

Issues Bulletin on County and Community Fairs.

County and Community Fairs is the title of a new bulletin just issued by the extension division of the Oregon Agricultural College. The authors of the bulletin are W. S. Brown, E. B. Pitts and C. C. Lamb, who state that its fourfold purpose is as follows:

To give methods of arrangement and management that will avoid lack of uniformity in best arrangement of exhibits.

To give information to producers and exhibitors that will aid them in selecting and preparing exhibits.

To aid fair officers in compiling premium lists.

To secure the adoption of a uniform system of classification, thereby enhancing the educational value of competitive exhibits.

It is thought that this information when acted upon will be an incentive to farmers to grow and exhibit more and better products. The bulletin will be sent free to all citizens of Oregon who request it.
