FADS AND FANCIES. A simple, effective glue that is harmless, colorless and odorless can be made by boiling tapioca in water.

If a rug curls at the edges moisten it and wrap around a curtain pole in the opposite way, then tie and let dry.

Before putting your liquid glue away after having used it, pour a few drops of vinegar into the bottle and you will find it like a freshly opened bottle when you use it again.

To run ribbons in underwear, if one does not have a tape needle handy, a small safety pin will answer.

Very few people know that cheese can be kept in good condition for a number of weeks by putting it away in a stone crock and covering it with salt. It will not mold or grow brittle, but will keep in shape for grating for a long period.

Old broomhandles sawed into six-inch lengths, then padded and covered with old bits of silk, etc., are excellent to wind ribbons on.

A new use for snap fasteners that I think all women will enjoy: Sew them on dress shields instead of pins or sewing in waist or corset cover. I have been doing this for some time and find it a great convenience. My dressmaker thought it a great scheme so thought I would pass it on.

When woolen blankets are past their best, cover with silklike and tack like a comfort.

Water will become hot in far less time and retain the heat much longer if a sheet of asbestos procured from any hardware dealer is wrapped around the tank that is connected with the kitchen

range. Openings should be cut for the pipes and the asbestos fastened with a twist of fine wire. The entire cost is but 25 cents.

To remove stains from knife blades, and also to keep the ivory from turning yellow, rub the handles well with a cut lemon, afterward wash in soap and water and dry immediately.

A very coarse scrubbing brush will be found the best thing for removing the threads, hairs, etc., which are so hard to get out of the brushes of a carpet sweeper.

Needles and pins will never rust if kept in a cushion filled with coffee grounds. Rinse the grounds in cold water, spread on a sheet of paper to dry thoroughly, and then stuff the cushion.

Tested Recipes. Creamed Veal with Mushrooms.—Four pounds of veal, boiled tender; one can of mushrooms, chopped; one quart of cream, heated; four tablespoonsful of butter and five tablespoonsful of flour, stirred together until melted. Put

hot cream, butter and flour in double boiler and cook until flour tastes done. Cut the meat as for salad and mix thoroughly with chopped mushrooms and cream. Put in baking dish with bread crumbs on top, bake from 12 to 15 minutes, until brown. Less cream can be used by putting in part milk.

Graham Pudding.—One cup of brown sugar, one cup of buttermilk, one cup of chopped raisins, one-half cup molasses, two cups graham flour, four tablespoonsful of melted butter, one teaspoon of soda, spices to taste. Steam two hours. Serve with whipped cream or any pudding sauce.

Baked Fruit Pudding.—Cream one-third of a cup of sugar and butter the size of one-half an egg; add one-half cup of milk and one cup of flour with which is sifted one-half teaspoon of baking powder and a pinch of salt, and last the white of an egg, well beaten. Bake in two layers, and put together while hot with apple sauce, jam or sliced peaches, and serve with it thin custard or cream.
