Slaps Douglas County Roads.

Douglas County's roads are the sore thumb of Western Oregon, so far as the automobile tourist is concerned, according to H. W. Stewart of Eugene, who has just returned from a two weeks' trip to the Exposition at San Francisco. Wherever travelers meet along the route, he says, they stop to talk of the terrific roads that are encountered there.

"The minute you leave Lane County and enter Douglas," said Mr. Stewart, "you strike bad roads and they are with you with a few exceptions until you cross into Josephine and Jackson. They are rough and stony and choppy, and 10 miles an hour is the best you can possibly make and protect your car. Lane County people don't know how to appreciate their blessings until they try to travel Douglas County's roads."

In Josephine and Jackson, Mr. Stewart says, the roads are fine, and the trip across the Siskiyou—once a terror to every traveler—is now a joy ride. Jackson County's part of the road is paved, and the grades are gradual and the curves easy. Many cars cross the range on high, and nearly all of them make it with no difficulty in intermediate.

From the Oregon line to Redding, Mr. Stewart reports, much roadwork is being done, and in a year or two the entire road from Portland to San Diego—with the exception of Douglas County—will be a dream of delight to the tourist.

Pears and Peaches Will Come In Soon.

Barlett pears in Lane County will be ripe enough to can by about the middle of this month, according to J. O. Holt, manager of the Eugene Fruit Growers' Association. "I think the pear crop in this valley is quite short," said Mr. Holt yesterday, "although I have not been out among the orchards lately." He said that earlier in the season he was informed by the growers that this crop was expected to be shorter than usual.

Alberta and Crawford peaches are also expected to be ready for canning about the same time. There is a large crop of both, as well as other varieties of peaches this year. Some of the early varieties are now ripening, but there are not many of them around here.

Evergreen blackberries have begun to arrive at the cannery. This crop is always large, as frost has no effect whatever upon it. These berries grow wild in nearly all parts of the county and tons of them go to waste every year for want of pickers. In places the vines have spread over many acres of land and are considered a pest by some of the farmers. They make a good canned product and sell just as readily as do the tame blackberries. They are also good eating in the raw state.

Another experiment has been tried by the association in vegetable canning. A quantity of turnips has been put up lately at the cannery and it is expected to sell them as readily as carrots have been sold. This is the first year that carrots have been put up by the association, and they are proving quite a success.—Eugene Register.

Sportsmen Will Ask S. P. to Transport Car Free of Charge.

Sportsmen of the state are deeply interested in the decision of the Southern Pacific company to hereafter make the regular charge for the transportation of the state's fish car, which is used in transporting fish fry to the streams of the state.

Inasmuch as Oregon's trout streams have been one of the greatest attractions to tourists, thereby greatly increasing railroad traffic, the Oregon Sportsmen's League will ask the railroad company to reconsider and transport the car free of charge as heretofore. If transportation charges on the car must be paid a large amount of propagation work can not be done, which will be a detriment to the streams of the state and make them less attractive to the tourist.
