LUMBER INDUSTRY SICK; MEDICINE ASKED FROM THE UNITED STATES.

Selling Under Federal Supervision, Restricted Production, General Agencies Wanted.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 6.—Representatives of \$1,000,000 capital invested in the lumber industry in Northern Idaho, Montana and Eastern Washington, employing 30,000 people, told the members of the United States trade commission today that the lumber business is suffering from over-production, unlimited and cut-throat competition and fear of government interference.

The lumbermen asked the commission to assist in the marketing of lumber under federal supervision and for the privilege of co-operating in limiting production and organizing general sales agencies.

John R. Toole, president of the Western Pine Manufacturers' Association, told the commission that the lumber business is sick, manufacturing is wasteful and the industry troubled with over production. Twenty-nine mills made a profit of 1.49 per cent on their \$30,000,000 capitalization over a period of six years ending with 1914, which did not pay the interest on the borrowed capital, Mr. Toole declared.

Eggs 4c a Dozen.

Buying eggs at 3 1/2 to 4 cents a dozen at Nanking, as reported by our consuls, brings about stiff competition with the American hen under the Underwood tariff law. The eggs are being shipped into our Pacific seaports millions a month.—Oregon Voter.
