PEACHES—FIRSTS—SECONDS—THIRDS.

It is my desire to grade and sell my peaches as follows, which I hope will not only enable me to dispose of my entire crop but will also result in the greatest good to the greatest number. To do this it is my purpose to make three grades. The First Grade will, as its name implies, consist of the larger peaches and running uniform in size—the extra selects. These are for those who have for their motto, "The best are the cheapest," who feel that they are entitled to the best and are willing to pay accordingly. Peaches graded thus ought to sell for 50c per box.

The Second Grade will consist of peaches not quite so large, and perhaps not so uniform in size, but all sound and of equally good quality. These are for those who are also entitled to the best, but who wish for any reason to cut the corners a little on price. These should sell for 40c per box.

The Third Grade will consist of peaches that are speckled or slightly damaged (not spoiled), and affording the most peach for the least money. It is my intention that these boxes shall contain as much usable peach material as either of the others, but of course, not in so fancy a form. These are designed for those who for any reason find it wise to adopt the motto, "The most for the least." This is not a device resorted to for getting rid of poor peaches, but is for the purpose of giving every one so far as possible the advantage of this most popular of canned fruits. These should sell for 30c per box. Each grade will be plainly labeled.

The following are the main varieties I have with about the order in which they will come on the market, beginning immediately: Early Charlotte, Early Crawford, Admiral Dewey, Improved Early Crawford, Klondyke, Muir, Elberta, Strawberry Cling, Lemon Cling.
