**TWO PENTECOSTS
TWO SALVATIONS**

The Holy Spirit to Be Poured Out Upon All Flesh.

Divine Plan Provides Two Distinct Salvations—The First Pentecost—Its Blessings For the Church Exclusively. Its Work Nearly Completed—The Second Pentecost—Its Blessings For Mankind in General, Through the Long-Promised Messianic Kingdom.

San Antonio, Texas, May 23.—Pastor Russell spoke here today from the text, "It shall come to pass afterward that I will pour out My Spirit upon all flesh."—Joel 2:28.

The Pastor demonstrated from his context that the Prophet Joel mentions two distinct outpourings of the Holy Spirit, one fulfilled at Pentecost more than eighteen centuries ago, the other still future. St. Peter's explanation of the first Pentecostal blessing (Acts 2:16) should not be taken to mean that what was witnessed in the upper room shortly after our Lord's ascension completely fulfilled this prophecy. No Bible student would dispute that the fulfillment began there and has continued ever since. It is as true today as with the early Church, that the blessing of the Holy Spirit is granted to all God's servants and handmaidens. The remainder of the prophecy will be fulfilled in due time.

After these days of the Gospel Age will come the glorious epoch of Messiah's Kingdom, through which God will pour out upon all mankind a great blessing of enlightenment and uplift from sin and death conditions. To the accomplishment of this end Satan shall be bound for a thousand years; and the darkness which now covers the earth will disappear.—Isaiah 60:2; Malachi 4:2; Habakkuk 2:14.

Abraham's Spiritual Seed First.

Abraham of old, the Pastor explained, typified Jehovah, and Isaac typified Messiah, born by a special Divine Interposition, according to God's promise. Of this antitypical Isaac class Jesus is the Head, the Church's Forerunner as well as the world's Redeemer. The Body of The Messiah is composed of a saintly few, gathered primarily from amongst the Jews, but being completed by additions from all nations. These will all be character-copies of God's dear Son. This is Divine predestination, according to St. Paul.—Romans 8:29, 30; Galatians 4:28; 3:8, 10, 29.

This Spiritual Seed of Abraham will constitute the Church of the First-born antitypes of the priests and the Levites of the Jewish Dispensation. With the completion of this Church, gathered out of all nations and denominations, Divine favor will again return to the natural seed of Abraham. As the Jew was granted the first opportunity of becoming the Spiritual Seed of Abraham, he will likewise have the first opportunity of participating in the blessing which will come upon all mankind. See Romans 11:25-29.

Here God foretells that Israel shall be the first to be blessed by Messiah: "There shall come out of Zion the Deliverer, and shall turn away ungodliness from Jacob." Zion is pictured as a mother whose offspring is The Messiah. Looking again at The Messiah, we see that Abraham and Sarah represent Jehovah and the great Covenant through which Messiah was to be developed. It has required more than eighteen centuries to give birth to this great Deliverer. Jesus was the Head; and the Church of the Gospel Age will be the Body. The First Resurrection will bring all these sons of God to the plane of glory, honor and immortality—born from the dead. Then the Deliverer will begin His work of blessing all nations.

"My Spirit Upon All Flesh."

The Pastor then pointed out a similarity as well as a difference between the two Pentecostal blessings. According to St. Peter (Acts 2:33), the glorified Jesus received the Holy Spirit from the Father and poured it out upon the early Church at the first Pentecost. The later blessing will come through the great Messiah as a result of the satisfaction which He will make for the sins of the whole world by applying to the race the merits of His sacrifice. By this He will seal the New Law Covenant with Israel, and then with the world through Israel. (Jeremiah 31:31-34.) Messiah will be the Mediator of that New Covenant, which will be based upon the "better sacrifices" offered by Him, as the antitypical High Priest.—Hebrews 9:19-23.

The world's Pentecostal blessing will not be upon the terms of their sacrificing their earthly rights to attain Heavenly blessings and spiritual sonship. Its requirements will be consecration to obedience of the Divine Law; and its reward will be restitution to perfection of human nature and to all the blessings originally given to Adam, but forfeited by his disobedience. This opportunity will be afforded every human being desirous of coming into accord with God. After all rejectors of God's grace shall have been destroyed in the Second Death, mankind will constitute the promised "seed of Abraham," whose number shall be as the sands of the seashore, even as the spirit-begotten ones of this Gospel Age are likened to the stars of heaven.

TWO TESTS FOR ANY CIGARETTE

The taste of the cigarette—according to a leading tobacco journal—is up to the smoker. But there are other qualities that you should look for in the cigarette that you are going to smoke. Here are a couple of tests that may help the average smoker to choose more wisely between different kinds of cigarettes.

The first test is for coolness, which means more comfort to the throat and tongue. Light an ordinary puff of smoke—a small, ordinary puff is not sufficient to make a test. Hold it in your mouth for a few seconds, and "float" around against your tongue. If the cigarette contains a high grade of mild tobacco, it will always feel COOL and smooth both to your throat and to your tongue.

On the other hand, if the proportions are not right and if the cigarette contains interior grades of tobacco or hidden strands of rank, oily leaf, you will feel a nipping sting at the tip of your tongue or that "sandpaper" tickle in your throat that "sandpaper" tickle in your throat after smoking all day?

If the tobacco in the cigarette include a correct proportion of mild grades—and if all of the various grades have been properly mellowed by age—and if they have been so blended as to bring out the best qualities in each of the different types of tobacco, you will be able to smoke practically whole or you will feel like it from the day without feeling any effect on the day.

But with another cigarette in which the blend is less skillful, even though the tobacco is of the highest grade, you will find along towards the end of the day that you are likely to have that feeling of having "smoked too much."
