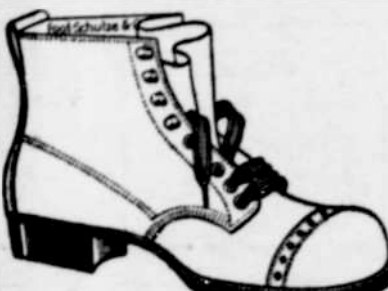

At 9 o'clock the band struck up a grand march and the Governor and wife taking the lead, were followed by hundreds of couples.

The uniforms and costumes displayed during the exercises in the afternoon were much talked about and admired, but the evening attire was gorgeous. The uniforms of the officers of the various arms of the service, each trimmed in the color designating the arm, and the rich evening costumes of the ladies, made a spectacle long to be remembered.

Dancing was indulged in until mid-

night to music by the C. A. C. band. At each corner of the immense hall were tables from which was served punch. There were 350 couples on the floor at one time, but no one was crowded, which gives some idea of the size of the floor.

MRS. T. K. CAMPBELL DIES AT SALEM

Formerly Lived in Cottage Grove and Had Many Friends Here.

Following a short illness, Mrs. Mary Campbell, wife of Thomas K. Campbell, chairman of the public service commission, died at the family home in

Salem, Thursday, Oct. 14, at the age of 52 years. With her husband, she was preparing for a trip to the San Francisco Exposition, but did not rally from a slight illness of October 3.

Mrs. Campbell's maiden name was Mary Ellen O'Connor and she was born July 4, 1863, at Columbus, Ohio. She was married in 1890 to Thos. K. Campbell at Leavenworth, Kansas, coming to Oregon in 1892.

Seven children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Campbell, the following six surviving: Thos. R., Eleanor, Marie, Gertrude, Catherine and William.

Besides the husband and children, she leaves two brothers, Frank O'Connor of Bush Springs, Cal., and James G. O'Connor of Salem.

The funeral was held Saturday morning at 10 o'clock from St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church. Burial beside the parents in the Catholic cemetery.
