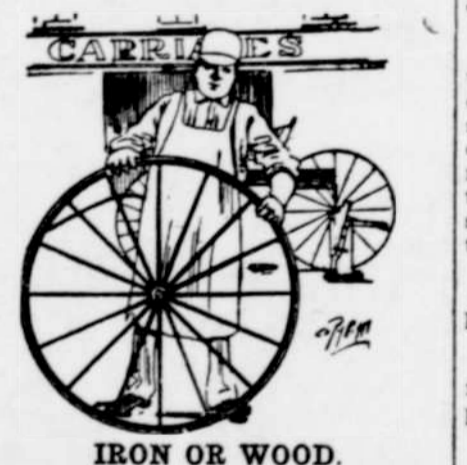

FADS AND FANCIES

If you wish to keep your pet bird in good health and song the following hints will be worth remembering: Don't leave a bird in a room which is being swept; dust injures its voice. Don't hang the bird in a window. Don't hang the bird in the sunshine, except just after a bath, and only long enough to dry the plumage. Don't hang the bird where there are draughts or in the kitchen, where there is steam or damp air. Don't give figs, sugar or candy. Don't allow the bird to fly about the room if you want his best songs. Don't feed mustard or turpentine seed. Don't fail to change the water in the cup from which the bird drinks every day, several times a day in hot weather.

Olive oil is a valued and useful article in the household. Among the uses for which it is invaluable here are a few: For burns it is of great use, besides removing the scabs; for "tickling" cough nothing is more simple and effective if taken often. It is good for the hair, chapped lips and hands; when the baby has the earache a few drops warmed and dropped in the ear will give relief; for household uses a small bottle kept on a convenient shelf will come into use every day.

Persistent and painful backache convinced me that I had some alarming disease. I doctored quite a bit for it; and then a shrewd old visitor put me on the right track by remarking that my sink and stove were several inches too low for a woman of my height. A small outlay for plumbing and carpenter work cured the backache forever.

For linen dresses there is nothing prettier than the straight full skirt.

When washing delicate curtains, stiffen in a little gum Arabic water in place of starch.

Plaster of Paris and white lead paint is a good cement to use for mending cracks in lavatories, bath tubs, etc.

Children who suffer from worms should be given a dinner once each week of onions, boiled or roasted.

Princess dresses are coming back in fashion, it is said, and one indication of their return is the front panel cut in one piece for waist and skirt shown on some of the new lingerie frocks. This gives a good chance for embroidery which is so much used on net and other lingerie frocks.

TESTED RECIPES

Cream of Pimento Soup.—Two table-spoonfuls of butter, 3 table-spoonfuls of flour, 2 ounces ripe pimentos cut into small pieces, 1 cup water or stock, 3 cups milk, a few drops of onion juice, salt. Cook the pimentos in the water or stock until they are soft, and rub them through a sieve, saving the water. Melt the butter and cook the flour in it, being careful not to brown the mixture. Add the milk, pimentos and the water in which they were cooked, and reheat, stirring constantly. Season with the onion juice and salt. A small piece of onion cooked with the pimentos can be substituted for the onion juice.

Cheesed Chops.—Two or three good sized chops cut from the shoulder of lamb. Have the butcher crack the bones, but not French them. If too fat trim off the fat. Cut off the ends and cook them with the chops. Season, dredge with flour, fry in hot drippings until a light brown, then add one-half cup of boiling water, cover and let simmer for about 20 minutes. Take out the chops, put them on a warm platter. To the gravy add one-half cup of

good sized cucumber. Mix the portion removed with a little finely chopped onion, green pepper, a leaf or two of finely chopped lettuce or romaine. Mix all with a little mayonnaise dressing and fill the cucumber shells. Serve on a lettuce leaf with a toasted cracker.

Cereal Batter Cakes.—Excellent batter cakes can be made by taking an equal quantity of flour and cold cereal, add salt to flavor and beat up with milk until it becomes a smooth batter, add one or two eggs according to the amount of batter; it should be of a consistency to drop from the end of a spoon readily. Bake on a griddle over a medium fire until nicely browned. Spread with currant jelly, pile one on top of another, and serve three to each person.

GIVE PLEDGE TO GOVERNOR

State University Students to Repay in Good Citizenship Debt to State.
University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 25.—Governor James Withycombe received this year the formal promise annually made by the students of the University of Oregon to repay in good citizenship their debt to the state. Governor Withycombe was cheered vigorously by the students, who subscribed to the following pledge:

"As a student of the University, that is maintained by the people of Oregon, I heartily acknowledge the obligation I shall owe them. The opportunity open to me here for securing training, ideals, and vision for life I deeply appreciate and regard as a sacred trust, and do hereby pledge my honor that it shall be my most deeply cherished purpose to render as bountiful return to the Oregon people and their posterity in faithful and ardent devotion to the common good as will be in my power. It shall be the aim of my life to labor for the highest good and glory of an even greater commonwealth."

Governor Withycombe in his address described to the students the changed sentiment toward the University that he had encountered throughout the state, which change he ascribed to the earnest character of the University's work.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

Greece answered the Bulgarian call to arms by ordering general mobilization of her land forces.
Germany's third war loan was over-subscribed \$507,000,000, according to official announcement. Ten billion marks (about \$2,500,000,000) was asked. Subscriptions totaled \$3,007,500,000.

The Italian official communication records the repulse of Austrian attacks at various points and declares that in the region of the Danua and Giudicaria valleys the Italians by a surprise attack succeeded in demolishing part of the Austrian trenches.
All the way from the Baltic port of Riga to the Pripet marshes the Russians are holding their line stubbornly in an attempt to bring their long retirement to an end. The fighting is particularly severe southeast of Vilna and east of Dvinsk. Envelopment of the Vilna army having failed, it is assumed the Germans will develop their offensive movement at Dvinsk, with the view of an ultimate blow at Riga.

American vessels carrying conditional contraband of war hereafter under no circumstances will be sunk by Germans, nor will American merchantmen carrying absolute contraband of war be sent to the bottom except in cases of extreme necessity. These promises are made to the United States in a new note from Germany concerning the sinking of the ship William P. Frye.

That the long-expected "drive" by the Anglo-French allies on the western front has begun is indicated by dispatches from London, Paris and Berlin. The Paris report says that gains have been made. Berlin declares the allies have suffered heavily. The offensive was preceded by an intense artillery bombardment lasting 50 hours. Fierce hand-to-hand fighting ensued at many points.

SHORT NEWS NUGGETS

Mrs. Russell Sage celebrated her 87th birthday by sending checks aggregating \$60,000 to various Syracuse, N. Y., institutions.

Aliens residing temporarily in the United States will come under the income tax law, according to recent ruling given out at Washington.

Atlanta, Ga., was selected as the 1916 meeting-place of the sovereign grand lodge of Odd Fellows at the closing session of the sovereign grand lodge in San Francisco.

Mrs. Wallace R. Stauffer of New Orleans, granddaughter of President Zachary Taylor, has presented to President Wilson, for the White house collection, several heirlooms belonging to her grandfather.

Upon their written assurance that they did not drink a toast to the kaiser, as had been charged, Captain Waldron and Lieutenant Garliner, of Fort Stevens, Or., were exonerated. General Hugh Scott, chief of staff, said he accepted their explanation.

"Let the states tax the products of government lands that are developed by private parties under government leases," is the answer made by Secretary Lane, of the interior department, to the western protest against the contemplated government leasing system.

Sofia Denies Aggression.
London.—The Bulgarian government officially communicated to the powers a note declaring, in the most categorical fashion, that the mobilization of the Bulgarian army was ordered in the national interest and had not the slightest offensive character.

American Consulate at Stuttgart Hit.
Washington.—The American consulate at Stuttgart, Germany, in the recent raid upon that place by French airmen, according to a message from Consul Higgins, was struck by a fragment of a bomb. He said no one in the consulate was injured.
