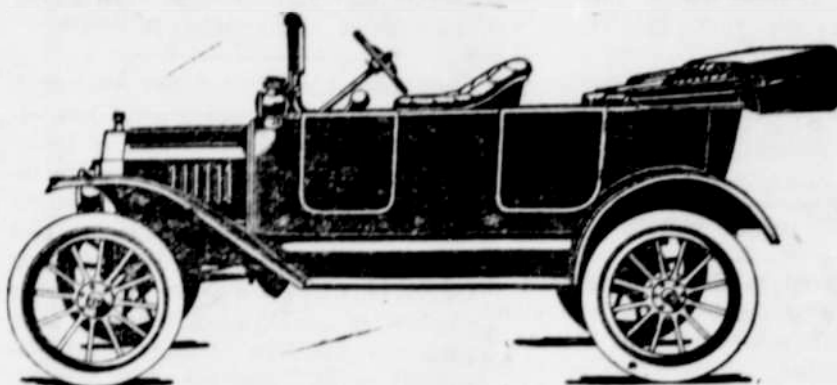

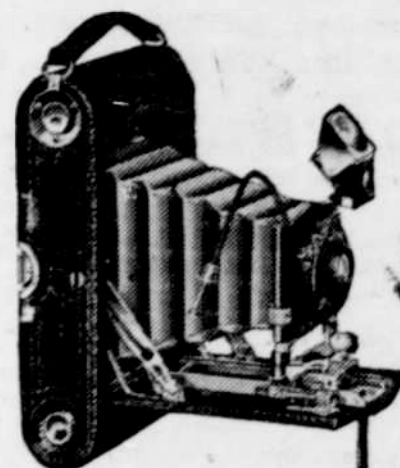

1000 BULGARS DIE IN BOMBARDMENT

London.—The bombardment of Dedeagach caused the death of ten civilians and more than a thousand soldiers, and a large number of soldiers were wounded, says a dispatch from Athens.

A large proportion of the military casualties, the correspondent adds, were in the barracks which housed the Fortieth Bulgarian regiment. The barracks were crowded with soldiers, who were preparing for their meal, when the bombardment was opened with accurately aimed shells, which demolished the barracks, burying the occupants in the ruins.

Troops engaged in digging trenches around the town also sustained heavy losses.

Fires caused by the exploding shells destroyed the railway station and surrounding buildings, doing enormous damage. It is said that the entire loss from the bombardment, which lasted four hours, will be several million pounds.

NEW ITALIAN CAMPAIGN ON

General Attack Along Entire Front Has Been Inaugurated.

Udine, Italy, via Paris.—The Italian army is making a general attack along the whole line from Switzerland to the Adriatic.

In the preceding five months of the Austro-Italian war, the efforts of the Italians have been directed at the penetration of Austrian territory and capture of strategic points for the purpose of securing Italy against the possibility of Austrian invasion.

In the opinion of the Italian general staff, this has been accomplished and the war is now entering its second phase.

Whitlock Unable to Save Nurse.

London.—The full report of the circumstances of the condemnation and execution of Miss Edith Cavell, an Englishwoman and head of a training school in Brussels, for helping Eng-

lish, French and Belgian soldiers to escape from Belgium, made by Brand Whitlock, the American minister at Brussels, to Walter H. Page, the American ambassador at London, was issued by the British government.

How the secretary of the American legation, Hugh S. Gibson, sought out the German governor, von der Lancken, late at night before the execution, and with the Spanish minister, pleaded with the governor and the German officers for the Englishwoman's life, is graphically related in a memorandum from Mr. Gibson.

GERMANY DEFENDS SHOOTING OF NURSE

Military Necessity and Fact
That Laws of War Know
No Sex Pleaded.

Berlin, via The Hague and London.—Dr. Alfred F. M. Zimmermann, German under-secretary for foreign affairs, has issued an official explanation of the recent execution in Belgium of Miss Edith Cavell, the British nurse. He prefaced his remarks by the declaration that he has examined every jot and tittle of the evidence with the greatest care and finds the verdict, though regrettable, to be just. His statement says in part:

"I see by the British and the American press that the shooting of an English woman and the conviction of several other women in Brussels of treason has created a great impression and that we are being severely criticized.

"It is indeed hard that a woman must be executed, but remember: to what shall a state come which is in war if it allows to pass unnoticed a crime against the safety of its armies because committed by a woman? No law book in the world, least of all those dealing with war regulations, makes such a differentiation, and the feminine sex has but one preference according to legal usages, namely, that women in a delicate condition may not be executed.

"Otherwise men and women are equal before the law, and only the degree of guilt makes a difference in the sentence for the crime and its consequences.

"Countless British, Belgian, and French soldiers now again are fighting in the allied ranks who owe their escape from Belgium to the activity of the band now sentenced, at the head of which stood Miss Cavell."

BRIEF WAR NEWS

Figures show an average loss to the British army of nearly 2500 men a day. A squadron of the allies bombarded the Bulgarian port of Dedeagach, in the Aegean sea.

Greece has declined, for the present, the allies' offer to her of Cyprus and other concessions, territorial and financial, in return for military aid to assist in meeting the Bulgarian and Austro-German attack against Serbia.

The Italian advance in Tyrol and Trentino is being carried out in conformity with the plan to relieve the pressure on Serbia. New successes are reported, and it is said that a general forward movement is under way.

Field Marshal von Hindenburg, in his attack on Riga, has reached Olai, which is half way between Riga and Mitau, and only a dozen miles southwest of the Baltic port. The German offensive extends along a front of about 70 miles.

The Russians by a dashing attack have carried the German positions southeast of Baronovichi, an important railway junction east of Slonim, on the Lida-Rovno railway, taking more than 3500 prisoners and, according to a German official admission, have continued their success on the middle Sty, south of the Pripiet marshes in Volhynia and Galicia.

There is no inclination in London or in the capitals of other members of the quadruple entente powers to minimize the seriousness of the situation of Serbia. The Austro-German and Bulgarian campaign is developing slowly. The Austro-German center is advancing down the Morava valley from Semendria, while the Bulgarians have got across this valley to the south and command the Belgrade-Nish-Saloniki railway.

SHORT NEWS NUGGETS

American cotton valued at approximately \$50,000,000, consigned to Germany, is held by Italy.

Mrs. Finley Shepard, formerly Helen Gould, and her husband, have adopted a 5 year old orphan boy.

All clubs at Yale college have been served with notice by the faculty that no liquor must be served hereafter.

Arlington, Va., talked by wireless telephone with Paris, France. Honolulu also heard the operator talking from Arlington.

Photos of the Panama canal blockade show that the extreme pressure on the high sides forced the bottom of it up, making it dry land.

Almost every railroad entering New York or with terminals on the New Jersey shore across the Hudson re-

ports a general revival of freight traffic unequaled since 1907.

After cutting telephone and power wires to prevent aid being called, firebugs started four fires at Horst. Bros. brewery hop ranch, east of Sacramento, causing damage of \$35,000.

European governments are making inquiries of the United States as to what assurances have been given by the newly recognized Mexican government with respect to foreign claims.

Three American troops were killed and eight wounded in a 40-minute battle with Mexican raiders at Ojo del Agua, on the American side of the Rio Grande, 60 miles from Brownsville, Texas. At least five Mexicans were killed.

Bulgarians Take Uskup.

Sofia, via London.—The Bulgarian troops have completely conquered Uskup, the chief Serbian town on the railway between Nish and Saloniki, according to an official communication.

GERMAN LIEUTENANT ARRESTED FOR PLOT

New York.—In the arrest of Albert Fay, a lieutenant in the German army, and Walter Scholz, his brother-in-law, police and federal secret service agents believe they have detained leaders in a plot to wreck American munition plants and ships carrying munitions.

According to Captain Tunney, of the New York anarchists squad, Fay confessed that he came here to work out a plan for stopping the shipment of munitions.

A vast quantity of high explosives were found in the prisoners' room in Weehawken, N. J.

Police who have been watching outgoing vessels for explosives caused the arrests.

Explosives and survey charts of New York harbor are said to have been found in their possession.

The men are declared to have been testing a bomb in a small grove when apprehended.

TRUST IS ORGANIZED TO HANDLE EXPORTS

Company, Recognized by U. S.,
Will Supervise Shipments
to Europe.

Washington.—Formation of an American Trust company, similar in organization to The Netherlands Overseas trust, to handle American products abroad with assurances that they will not reach the belligerents, was announced by Secretary Redfield of the department of commerce.

This was regarded as meaning that the American Overseas Trust company will assure the European governments with which it deals that no goods exported under its supervision will reach opposing belligerents.

"The object of the scheme," Secretary Redfield said, "is to secure the movement of neutral commerce under such authoritative auspices as to assure that it will not be interrupted. That part of the plan to be undertaken by the department of commerce, under the arrangements discussed, would be the ascertaining, by commercial attaches, commercial agents and other officers, that the operations of the plan were strictly impartial and neutral.

"The new company would be open to assist all truly neutral American commerce to all countries with which it is to operate. The machinery would not be officially a part of the government and it would not be a money-making scheme."

Carranza Is Appreciative.

Washington.—General Carranza, through his representative here, Eliseo Arredondo, addressed a note to the United States and the other American republics which have recognized his government, expressing his appreciation of their action and announcing that diplomatic representatives soon will be accredited to the various countries.
