There are more men students than women students at the university of Oregon, according to the latest figures issued by the registrar. Of the 783 registered so far this year, 427 are men and 356 are women. The senior class numbers 105 and the juniors are 137 strong. REV. C. A. WOOLEY, AN AGED MINISTER DIES.

Known and Revered by Early Settlers of Cottage Grove.

Rev. C. A. Wooley died at his home in Eugene Oct. 26, aged 79 years. He was one of the best and most widely known of the ministers of the Willamette Valley and was the organizer of many churches, including the one at Cottage Grove, of which he was pastor for some time.

Rev. Mr. Wooley was one of the first Cumberland Presbyterian ministers to come to Oregon. He built many churches and was the organizer of the Fairmount Cumberland Presbyterian Church of Eugene. He also organized churches at Junction City, Albany and Seio and was foremost in this district in uniting the Cumberland Presbyterian denomination with the parent church.

Carey Allen Wooley was born in Gerard County, Kentucky, Nov. 22, 1836. He was married at Trenton, Mo., in 1859, and started west soon afterward. On his journey to the coast he stopped at Denver, where he worked in the mines for two years to procure funds with which to continue his journey.

There he bought a "prairie schooner," four mules and supplies, and continued the trip to Oregon. He arrived at Eugene in 1865 with his family and resided in this part of the state until his death. His first services after arriving were in the old Bailey school house, three miles southwest of Eugene.

Rev. Mr. Wooley was afterward stationed at Luckiamute, in Polk County, where he preached for three years, after which he was pastor at Junction City, Lebanon, Seio, Eugene, Cottage Grove, Brownsville, Albany and Fairmount.

He leaves a wife, two brothers, J. S. Wooley of Harrisburg and J. C. Wooley of Los Angeles, besides two sons, L. F. Wooley and J. C. Wooley, both of Eugene; also two daughters, Mrs. George Walker of Oregon City and Mrs. King of Wendling. A granddaughter, Mrs. George Scott, lives at Cottage Grove.

Funeral Thursday, conducted by Rev. W. V. McGee, his pastor.

ATHLETICS AT UNIVERSITY

Putting Sports Back in Their Proper Place.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 25.—State University athletics are "notably free from objectionable practices" but some changes are necessary to increase their educational value. This has been the finding of the faculty investigating committee of seven. The faculty has accordingly voted the following changes:

Basketball is suspended at present as an intercollegiate sport.

The pre-season training camp for football men is ordered discontinued.

Practice for varsity football and baseball teams is limited to from 4 to 6:30 o'clock p. m. during school days.

Intercollegiate football contests are limited to seven in any one season.

Intercollegiate baseball schedules are restricted to teams west of the Cascades; provided that one or more games may be played with the winner of the eastern division to determine the north-west championship.

Official representatives of the University are forbidden to scout for athletes. The committee found this practice apparently at a minimum in the University of Oregon.

The University's representatives in the northwest college conference meetings shall hereafter be faculty members.

Students who have not passed three-fourths of the full work of the University the previous semester are barred from all student activities.

With the foregoing modifications intercollegiate sports are retained, but as subordinate to intramural athletics.

The faculty further recommended to the northwest college conference abolition of scouting and passage of a rule that no one may represent his institution in intercollegiate games until he has been in attendance one year.

The faculty also declared for the building up of purely campus sports

The committee believes the excessive publicity given athletics tends to warp student judgment as to their relative importance in a college course.

The legislation goes into effect at once.

Guffey Found Guilty

Dale Guffey was yesterday found guilty of the crime of polygamy. The jury was out only a short time. He will be sentenced later.

Guffey has had quite a career, according to his record obtained by the sheriff's force. According to information in the hands of the officers he served a term in an eastern penitentiary and before going to the East he served in the state reform school of California, escaping from that institution. Coming to Eugene, he married a young

woman without first having gone through the formality of obtaining a divorce from his first wife. He claimed he thought she had obtained the decree, and she, too, though she was free, having heard that Guffey had obtained a divorce and she was married again.

Since Guffey's arrest she obtained the divorce and was legally married to her second husband. On August 5 Guffey, who was in the county jail and was treated as a trusty, walked away while he was entrusted to empty a bucket of slop in the rear of the jail. He was caught October 5 in Visalia, Cal., and brought back to Eugene by Sheriff Parker.
