Judge Skipworth has denied the motion filed by L. M. Travis, attorney for the defendant in the State against Frank Henderson, of Cottage Grove, accused of bootlegging, for the postponement of his trial until next term of court. Henderson was tried once this term, the case resulting in a hung jury. His attorneys moved for a continuance of the case until next term, giving as their reason that C. W. Hanners, the detective employed by the state, was seen several times in company of the jurymen and this fact might have a bearing on the case. The motion was overruled because of the objection of District Attorney Devers, who stated that inasmuch as Detective Hanners' parents had left Eugene he was afraid Mr. Hanners would also leave and thus state would be without a witness.

Editors For Valley Lumber Mills

The editors of the state, while in session at Salem last week, adopted a strong resolution endorsing the new lumber rate to California points put in to effect by the Southern Pacific Co. The resolution was submitted by Editor Bede of Cottage Grove and Editor Ingalls of Corvallis and was as follows: "Resolved: That as the Willamette valley is largely dependent upon the lumber and sawmill industry which under conditions that will permit its successful and profitable operation puts large amounts of money in the channels of trade, it is the recommendation of this association that no action should be taken by the interstate commerce commission to change the railroad freight rates now operative between Portland and Willamette valley points to California, that would have any tendency to retard the development of the Willamette valley sawmill industry."
