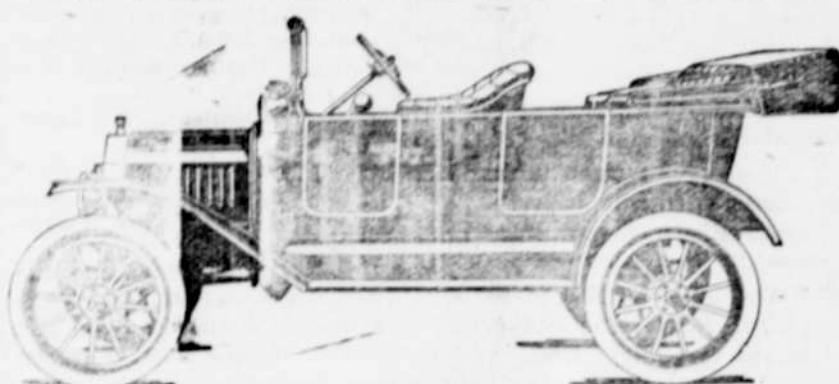

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Portland's public schools next year will cost the taxpayers approximately \$2,650,000.

The annual Oregon Irrigation Congress will be held in Portland December 28-30, at the Imperial Hotel.

A fire destroyed half a block in the business district of Independence, entailing a loss of \$20,000, with an insurance of about \$10,000.

Eastern Oregon has furnished just half of the county entries in the land products section of the Manufacturers' and Land Products Show at Portland.

Jones and Murray, of Modesto, Cal., have just purchased the Harpold property of 1400 acres in the Bonanza district of Klamath county and paid \$40,000 for it.

Seventy-five editors and publishers from all parts of the state convened at Salem for the two-day annual meeting of the Oregon State Editorial association.

Because a piece of apple lodged in his windpipe, 3-year-old Albert, son of Mr. and Mrs. William N. Saunders, of Richland, died at Baker in St. Elizabeth's hospital.

The Dallas band has at last won its fight for municipal support. After January 1, 1916, the Dallas band of 40 pieces, will be a regular municipal institution and under control of the city council.

The financial statement of the state industrial accident insurance commission covering the 16 months prior to October 31 last, shows receipts totaling \$779,141.05 and disbursements of \$630,980.57.

Governor Withycombe has issued paroles to seven inmates of the state prison, whose release had been recommended by the state parole board. The board considered 26 cases at its recent meeting.

The Oregon Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis is preparing to launch its campaign for funds by holding a sale of Red Cross seals. This will begin on December 1 and will close December 24.

Don. J. Zumwalt, who has a crew of surveyors at work on Klamath

Marsh, in the northern part of Klamath county, reports that the preliminary work in the drainage of the marsh is progressing nicely.

Approximately 55,800 head of central Oregon sheep have passed through Bend in the last month to the winter range near Coleman and to other ranges in the state for feeding preparatory to shipment to coast stock markets.

Several hundred teachers and educators are expected to gather in Pendleton next week to attend the annual teachers' institute, November 17, 18 and 19. The district includes the counties of Morrow, Wheeler, Gilliam and Umatilla.

Growers from all sections of the Hood River valley report that the apple crop for the season is now gathered and under roof. Several hundred packers are now at work sorting, grading and packing the apples in boxes for the trade.

According to plans announced to members of the commercial club by C. N. Ravlin, the huge apple displayed by the Hood River commercial club in the Palace of Horticulture at the Panama-Pacific exposition, may be placed on permanent display in Portland.

Oregon's first drainage district formed under the new state law, has successfully floated a bond issue and is now prepared to work actively toward the reclamation of a large area of fertile soil. The district lies in Clatsop county between Knappa and Westport.

A statewide campaign for a dry national issue was started in Oregon Monday and 40 central meetings, with speakers of national reputation, are to be held in all sections of the state during the next few days, closing with a state convention in Portland November 16 and 17.

By elimination of superfluous matter from Oregon's house and senate journals of the 1915 legislative session and condensation into one volume, the cost of publication this year was cut to \$2753.63, as compared with \$4320.50 paid out for the 1913 journals, printed in two volumes.

Twice as many cars have been furnished Oregon shippers so far in the month of November as during the

same period in October, according to the public service commission, but the shortage, although less acute, still exists, and is especially felt by the lumber manufacturers.

The North Coast Power company, of Vancouver, Wash., has filed with Corporation Commissioner Schuller its declaration of intention to engage in business in this state. Its capital is \$1,750,000, and it has taken over the properties of the Washington & Oregon Utilities company.

The bridge across the Willamette river at Salem between Marion and Polk counties has been re-opened and both business interests of Salem and farmers and dairymen are no longer subject to the enormous inconveniences suffered during the past two weeks. The bridge will remain open while repairs are completed.

IRISH REFUSED PASSAGE

Riotous Scenes Mark Attempt of 900 to Leave for United States.

Liverpool.—After riotous scenes in front of the Cunard steamship offices here because 900 young Irishmen who had booked passage to America on the liner Saxonia refused to heed the appeals of recruiting officers, the Cunard company canceled all 900 bookings, and shortly afterward posted an announcement that no Britishers eligible for military service would be carried on its vessels.

A jeering crowd gathered about the Cunard docks when the party arrived to embark on the Saxonia. Several fights started. Two of the would-be emigrants were knocked down. Nevertheless, the party forced its way to the gangplank.

As they started on board the liner, however, a large proportion of the firemen came ashore with the ultimatum: "We don't see why we should stoke if these stokers are allowed to run away."

FORM NEW GREEK CABINET

New Prime Minister Regarded Friendly Toward Quadruple Entente.

Athens, via Paris.—Skouloudis, commissioned by King Constantine to form a new cabinet, has accomplished the task. All the members of the Zaimis ministry are retained except the premier himself.

The new prime minister has taken the portfolio of foreign affairs, and is reputed to be favorably disposed toward the quadruple entente. The formation of the new cabinet, it is generally assumed, will delay if not eliminate the crisis which probably would follow dissolution of the chamber of deputies by the king.

The press urges the advisability of going on without a dissolution of parliament and new general elections.

M. Skouloudis, the new Greek premier, has declared his intention of observing an attitude of "very benevolent neutrality" toward the entente powers.

41,386 Wets March in Chicago Parade.

Chicago.—Forty-one thousand three hundred and eighty-six persons, by actual count, paraded the streets of Chicago in protest against the enforcement of the Sunday-closing law.

It had been announced that more than 100,000 persons had been pledged to parade. The day was perfect and returns indicate that the liquor forces turned out their extreme strength.

The demonstration was overwhelmingly foreign in its make up.

KITCHENER GOES TO EASTERN WAR ZONE

London.—Lord Kitchener, at the request of his colleagues, has left England for a short visit to the eastern theater of war.

The announcement that Lord Kitchener is to visit the east did not come as a surprise. It was generally believed when it became known he was about to undertake a mission that the Balkans would be his destination.

It is thought that his activities will not be confined to this theater of the war, however, but that he will visit Egypt to inspect the defenses of the Suez canal against a possible German or Turkish attack.

Besides this, it is understood that his duties will include efforts to co-ordinate the work of the general staffs of the allied armies.

ALLIES DEFEAT BULGARIANS

Serbian Invaders are Retreating on Two Fronts, Say Reports.

London.—The Bulgarian army descending into Old Serbia to invade Macedonia by way of Veles and Perlepe was defeated at Izvor, at the entrance of the Babuna pass, after a battle lasting several days, according to announcement made by the Serbian legation at Athens and transmitted to Reuters' Telegram company.

French infantry and British cavalry took part in the struggle and gave efficient aid to the Serbians. The British horsemen arrived from Krivoliak to assist their allies.

The Serbians captured Izvor and Gradska.

The Bulgarians, whose ranks are said to have been decimated, are retreating in the direction of Veles, and have evacuated the right bank of the Vardar river.

NISH TAKEN AFTER THREE DAYS' FIGHT

Invaders Now Hold More Than Half of Country and Most of Railroad System.

Berlin.—The Bulgarians have captured Nish, second city of Serbia and its temporary capital for a time after the evacuation of Belgrade. There was a three days' battle, according to the official announcement issued here, in which the invaders were confronted with desperate opposition at various points outside the town. The report says that 350 Serbians were taken prisoners and that two cannon fell into the hands of the Bulgarians. It is presumed that the prisoners mentioned were a rearguard left to defend the last position and that the Serbians succeeded, as they have done in the past, in removing most of their military supplies.

Other victories over the Serbians by both the Bulgarians and the Austro-Germans are reported. It is said that the town of Kraljevo, 35 miles from Kraguyevats, was taken by Germans, and the Austro-Germans took Varvarin, on the Morava river, 40 miles northwest of Nish. The German war office says 3000 prisoners were taken at Varvarin.

More than half of Serbia is now in possession of the invaders, who also have taken the greater part of the country's railroad system.
