SCHOOL ATTENDANCE BEST IN HISTORY

Total of 10630 Days for Month Is a New Record.—High School Now Has 157

The enrollment and attendance in the Cottage Grove schools continues to improve despite sickness among the pupils. The month's report by Supt. Dunton shows 574 pupils over 14 years of age compared with 509 last year, whole days attendance of 10634, compared with 10004 last year, 394 neither absent nor

lardy compared with 376 last year, 546 belonging compared with 500 last year, per cent of attendance of 97.2 compared with 98 last year, 157 in high school compared with 124 last year, 24 visits by parents and 5 by school directors. The whole days attendance is the most remarkable ever made by the local schools.

ALUMNI DEFEATS H. S. BY SCORE OF 44 TO 0

Weight of Winners Is Big Factor in Scoring.—School Team Minus Several Regular Players

The high school team met a decisive defeat Saturday afternoon at the hands of a combination alumni team. The score was 44 to 0. The alumni won the game on sheer strength and weight and their backs were able to plough through the lighter line of their opponents for repeated gains of twenty and thirty yards. The ability of the high school boys to use the forward pass kept the score down. After every score the high school would receive the kick and nearly every time worked the ball well up into the alumni territory before losing the ball. After the alumni got the ball it was all off until the next kick-off as the high school did not hold the alumni for downs once in the entire game.

The high school team was minus three regular players which accounted in part for their showing. Mills and Combs, the regular tackles, were both out and also Sam Vetch, the plunging left half.
