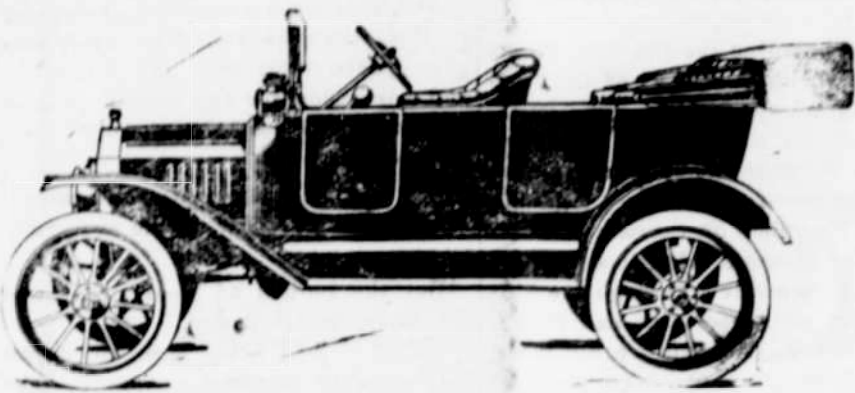

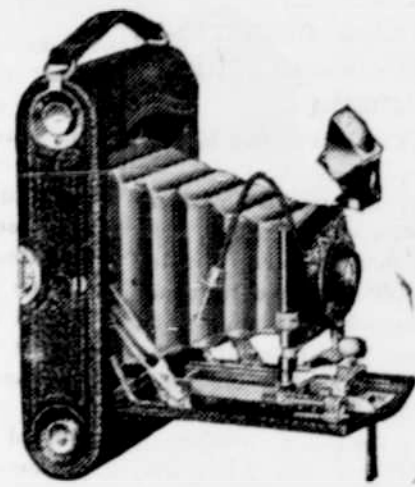

In Opposition to Preparedness May Necessitate Republican Support.

Washington.—The administration already begun to count noses in the national defense is now being learned here. Reiteration of former Secretary of State Bryan's open opposition emphasized the city of a "lineup."

FISH BLOCKADE HELD INEFFECTIVE

Washington.—The United States is the first to Great Britain made here covering exhaustively the

British interference with American trade since the beginning of the European war, declares that the so-called blockade instituted by the allies against enemy countries on March 11, is "ineffective, illegal and indefensible."

Notice is served that the American government "cannot submit to the curtailment of its neutral right and it cannot with complacency suffer further subordination of its rights and interests."

Ambassador Page to whom the note was sent by special messenger for delivery to the London foreign office, was instructed by Secretary Lansing, "to impress most earnestly" upon the British government that the United States "must insist that the relations between it and His Majesty's government be governed, not by a policy of expediency, but by those established rules of international conduct to which Great Britain in the past has held the United States to account when the latter nation was a belligerent engaged in a struggle for national existence."

Declaring the United States "unhesitatingly assumes" the task of championing the integrity of neutral rights, the note proclaims that the American government will devote its energies to the task, exercising always an impartial attitude.

HINDU INVASION IS FEARED

John L. McNab Says Court Has Lowered Bars to Orientals.

San Francisco.—That a recent decision of the United States supreme court, in which it was decided that a band of Russians could not be kept out of the country because there was not work for them in the place for which they were bound, would open the doors to a Hindu invasion of California and the United States, was the opinion expressed by John L. McNab, ex-United States district attorney here.

According to Mr. McNab, federal judges of this district will have to accept in their future rulings the principle laid down by the supreme court in the case of the Russians.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

German submarines have again passed through the straits of Gibraltar, where three French steamships and one Italian were sunk.

In the western zone the Germans continue their attacks against the new French positions in Champagne, but little ground is changing hands.

There is evidence of renewed activity in Gallipoli and the impression prevails that another big attempt will be made to open the straits before German ammunition reaches the Turks.

Advices from Saloniki and other points show that much larger forces than were thought to be near the scene are being landed at Saloniki and are proceeding to points where it is believed they can do the most good.

The Montenegrins, like their Serbian allies, are fighting stubbornly in defense of their country and report that they have repulsed an attempt by

the Austrians to cross their border from Herzegovina and captured four guns.

Along the eastern front the past week has seen no permanent Slav gains of any importance. Von Hindenburg was compelled to abandon about ten miles of fortified positions near Dvinsk, but by counter attacks the lost ground was recovered by the Germans within 48 hours.

In the south the allied forces appear to be too strong for the Bulgarians, who admit that they are faced by superior numbers. It is reported through the Serbian legation at Athens that the British, French and Serbians have inflicted a severe defeat on the Bulgarians at Izvor, 10 miles west of the Vardar river.

The Bulgarians have occupied Nish, the Serbian war capital, which gives them complete control of the railway from Prahovo, on the Danube, and thus opens a through route for the central powers to Sofia and Constantinople. In addition the Bulgarian and German main armies have effected a junction at Krivir, so that the campaign, which has been somewhat slower than expected, probably will move at a faster pace.

SHORT NEWS NUGGETS

The national dairy council, in session at Chicago, started a campaign of education to urge people to drink more milk.

Twelve men and girls are known to have lost their lives in a fire that destroyed an old four-story brick and wooden factory building in the Williamsburg section of Brooklyn.

President Yuan Shai Kai and the Chinese parliament have definitely decided to issue bonds for \$10,000,000 to start a new steamship line between San Francisco and China, according to word received in San Francisco.

For the first time in history, an order to a naval commander was transmitted by wireless telephone, when sitting at his desk, Secretary of the Navy Daniels "called up" Rear Admiral Usher, commander of the Brooklyn navy yard.

Mrs. Gaither Drewry, Spencer county, Ky., has given birth to nine children within 18 months, believed to be a world's record. Eighteen months ago there were born five children, three boys and two girls. The girls died. She has just become the mother of four more boys.

The American Society of Civil Engineers, at its meeting in Chicago, drafted a federal law looking to the construction of a \$50,000,000 project for the manufacture of nitrates on the Columbia river, in Oregon. The measure will urge congress to clear title to water power sites desired.

Huerta Allowed to Leave Fort Bliss.

El Paso.—Victoriano Huerta, former Mexican dictator, who is facing a charge of violating American neutrality through the organization of another revolt, was removed from Fort Bliss to his home in this city, on account of illness.

To Create a Vacuum.

If you have ever worked in a physical laboratory you probably have seen a vacuum receiver and learned how difficult it is to create a perfect vacuum even with this instrument.

A vacuum can be created in a single way by using two drinking glasses, a small candle end and a piece of blotting paper. The glasses must be the same size and of the thin glass kind. The candle end is lighted and put into one glass, the blotting paper is well dampened and placed on top of the glass, the other glass inverted and its rim placed exactly over the lower one and pressed down tightly. The candle will burn up all the oxygen in the glass and go out.

The air in the glass, being heated, will expand, and some of it will be forced out from under the moist paper; then as the portion remaining cools it will contract and draw the upper glass on the paper and create an air tight joint. The upper glass can be taken up and the lower will cling to it.—Kansas City Journal.

COTTON GROWN IN OREGON

Member of State Experiment Station Gets Plant 30 Inches Tall.

Hood River.—Probably the first cotton ever to be grown to maturity in Oregon has been raised this year on the J. F. McLean place by LeRoy Childs, a member of the staff of the local branch of the Oregon state experiment station. While the cotton was not planted until in June, it is now 30 inches tall and the branches are loaded with bolls two inches in length. The bolls, filled with fiber, probably will burst open when touched by the first heavy frost.

"In a year with normal weather," says Mr. Childs, "I do not think the cotton plants would have thrived so well. The long continued dry, warm weather of autumn has allowed it to attain its growth."

Putnam to Study Prison Management.

Salem.—George Palmer Putnam, secretary to Governor Withycombe, has left for the east on a visit connected with family business, his father, J. Bishop Putnam, of the publishing firm of G. P. Putnam Sons, having died October 8. At the request of the governor he will visit Sing Sing prison in New York and Stillwater prison in Minnesota to get first hand information concerning certain phases of prison administration. He is also to meet with a representative of an extensive flax manufacturing firm in New York which is considering the possibility of establishing a manufacturing plant in Oregon.

Sunday Closing Summons Issued.

Portland.—District attorneys and sheriffs of 25 counties in Oregon were served by United States Marshal Montag's office with copies of federal court orders to appear in Portland November 15 and show cause why an injunction against Oregon's Sunday-closing law should not be granted to the Brunswick-Balke-Collender company, of Chicago. Suit was brought on the ground that the Sunday law conflicts with both state and federal constitutions.
