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THE NEW BIRTH OF CHURCH AND WORLD

Church's Regeneration Now, World's During Millennium.

Adam and His Race Legally Dead. The Dying Processes Thorough. Faith, the Only Door, Is Limited by Knowledge to Few—"Few There Be That Find It"—Hope For the Unregenerate in Messiah's Kingdom.

Toledo, O., July 11.—Pastor Russell is here, attending the I. B. S. A. Convention. Today his text was, "Ye which have followed Me, in the regeneration, when the Son of Man shall sit in His Throne, ye also shall sit on twelve thrones."—Matthew 19:28.

The speaker's introductory statement doubtless sent a shock to many of his hearers. He declared that none are members of the Church of Christ except the regenerate; and that this fact was emphasized by Jesus, saying, "Ye must be born again." This teaching has practically disappeared from the pulpit. The hearts of Christian people seem to be more tender than were those of their fathers; they refuse to think of the great mass of humanity as subjects for eternal torture at the hands of the Devil. Hence they ignore the Scriptural doctrine of regeneration and endeavor to convince themselves that it cannot be necessary.

Bible students are beginning to see that there is a regeneration for the world in the Millennium quite separate and distinct from the regeneration now possible to the Church. When we get the Bible teaching that the dead are unconscious, sleeping until the Resurrection Morn, we see that the regeneration of the Little Flock now will not hinder the masses from regeneration by and by. On the contrary, the regenerated Church will be associated with Messiah in the regeneration of the world.

Those now being regenerated are an elect class, having not only a special love for righteousness and hatred of iniquity, but a special faith in God and His promises. By means of these promises and the discipline of life, these elect regenerate become especially qualified for God's service. Furthermore, the regenerating processes of the present time are with a view to bringing the Church to a new nature. Their regeneration began when God imparted to them the Holy Spirit, following their full consecration to Him through the Redeemer, and will continue throughout their lifetime, as they grow in character-likeness to God's dear Son.—Romans 12:2; 2 Corinthians 5:17; 2 Peter 1:4.

"Sit on Twelve Thrones, Judging."

Reverting to his text, the Pastor demonstrated that the Heavenly Father has a Plan for the regeneration of the non-elect during Christ's Millennial Reign; and that all faithful followers of Jesus will share with Him in His Kingdom power and glory. While doubtless some special honor is provided for the twelve Apostles, nevertheless all elect regenerate who prove faithful to their spirit-begetting will reign with Christ.—Rev. 3:21; 2:26; 20:6.

The speaker felt sure that none of the Lord's people whose hearts have been purified by the regenerating influences of the Holy Spirit could have a selfish or unkind feeling toward the unregenerate world—so that they would object to the thought here presented. Selfishness, and every desire to exclude others from Divine blessings and favors, signifies so much of sin in control of the mind. Love not only thinketh no evil, but is glad to find in God's Word various promises to the effect that all of earth's families shall yet be blessed through the Spiritual Seed of Abraham—Christ and the Church.

All Mankind Need Regeneration.

Then the Pastor showed that some fail to see the world's need of regeneration, although they see the necessity for the Church's regeneration. But there would be no Kingdom of God, no Millennium, no regeneration for the world, if God purposed only the salvation of the Church. Everywhere the Bible tells of God's compassion toward the world, as well as His particular love for the true Church. The whole world has been provided for in the glorious sacrifice of Jesus. (John 3:16.) Christ's death is not in vain, nor merely for the Elect few. Through these Elect the great mass of mankind, non-elect and unfit for the Kingdom, are to be blessed with the opportunity for regeneration to perfect human nature, the image of God, lost through sin.

The regeneration of the world will be to human nature, lost in Adam, redeemed by the sacrifice of Christ's human life. At the beginning of Messiah's Reign Satan will be bound, that he may deceive humanity no more. The great Life-Giver will provide opportunity for a regeneration to the billions who died in Adam and who were redeemed through Messiah's death.

At the conclusion of that blessed Millennial Reign, when all wilful sinners shall have been destroyed in the Second Death, the Revelator's words will be fulfilled—every creature in Heaven and on earth shall be heard saying, "Praise, glory, honor, dominion be unto Him that sitteth upon the Throne and unto the Lamb forever."

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Auto Accident Fatal.

La Grande.—Robert Mays, 55, who a few weeks ago completed a four-year term as postmaster of Elgin, was instantly killed when his automobile went over a grade. Joseph Bush, who was in the car with him, escaped serious injury, though pinned under the overturned car for half an hour before a passing farmer saw their plight and pulled the machine off the two men.

Big Timber Sale Is Made.

Portland.—E. J. Young, of Madison, Wis., left for the east after arranging for the purchase of approximately 12,000 acres of timber land in Lincoln county from the trustees of the creditors of the C. A. Smith lumber company, of Minneapolis and Coos Bay. The transfer of ownership is said to involve a consideration of about \$750,000, part of which is said to have been advanced, it is understood.

Industrial Accident Fund Grows.

Salem.—As a result of an announcement by the state industrial accident commission that under the compensation act employers who made contributions to the accident fund for six months prior to July 1 would be entitled to an exemption of their payments for July, \$49,139.09 has been paid into the fund during the first 17 days of this month by employers who desire to receive the benefit of the exemption.

The exemption for July was made by the commission after it had been found that the accident fund was unusually large. Though employers and workmen are granted freedom from paying the July contribution, they will enjoy the same protection and benefits from the fund as though the payments had been made.

MOONSHINING IS ALLEGED

Still in Wilds of McKenzie River Mountains Is Raided by Sheriff.

Eugene.—For five years moonshine whisky has found its way into Eugene, say the officers, and furthermore they declare they have known that it was manufactured on the McKenzie river, and have known the identity of its manufacturers all the time. For five years these two men are said to have so terrorized the neighborhood that no assistance to the officers has been available. The mountains are wild and rugged.

Two men, whom the officers say are the offenders, are in jail charged with the illicit manufacture of liquor. A still, hidden in the brush of the pocket of the McKenzie river mountains, 30 miles east of Eugene, was raided. The men are James Williams and Mark Broom. The latter lives with a family in Springfield, and the other lives in the mountains. It is these men whom the officers have shadowed almost in vain for five years.

Broom was arrested early in the morning hours before daybreak after a sensational 20-mile chase, in which Sheriff Parker, in a motor car, overtook him before he reached safety in the mountains. He was heavily armed, but submitted to arrest without resistance. In the vehicle was a five-gallon keg of moonshine whisky.

"We can tell it is moonshine whisky because there is none other like it," said Mr. Parker. The officers say it has been sold as "white mule" whisky because of its "kick."

Park Promised by Forester Graves.

Portland.—The withdrawal at once of more than 14,000 acres of land in the Oregon national forest, through which the Columbia River Highway extends, and the fact that funds are now available for the location survey of the proposed 20-mile road from Mt. Hood Lodge to Government Camp are two important announcements made by Henry S. Graves, chief forester of the United States forestry service, while on a visit here.

This preserves forever many scenic spots along the great road for park and recreation purposes. During lunch at Eagle Creek Forester Graves announced that funds were available for the location survey of the proposed 20-mile road, the building of which will provide the long-desired highway to encircle Mount Hood and give a roadway replete with scenic wonders.

Flax Harvesting Ordered.

Salem.—J. C. Cady, flax expert employed by the state, and Harry P. Minto, superintendent of the penitentiary, were instructed by the state board of control to begin at once the harvesting of the flax crops in the vicinity of Salem. The convicts will do the pulling, but the farmers must pay for the hauling to the penitentiary, where the seed and fiber will be prepared for market.

VILLA GARRISON IN SONORA IN REVOLT

Douglas, Ariz.—The Villa garrison at Nogales, Sonora, including the forces left there by Jose Maytorena, are in revolt and on the verge of turning over to Carranza, according to official advices here.

General Villa, with most of his artillery and cavalry, arrived at Naco, Sonora, a border town a few miles west of Agua Prieta, whence he withdrew recently following a two days' battle with the Carranza forces under General P. Elias Calles.

Just what the intentions of Villa are is not generally known, but his retirement to Naco is taken in Mexican circles here to mean that Villa is preparing to take the defensive.

General Calles remains in Agua Prieta and with General Alvaro Obregon is preparing to carry out orders said to have been received for the extermination of Villa's army.

Sunday Law Held Invalid.

Portland.—Judge Gantenbein held the Sunday-closing law of 1864 unconstitutional, on the ground that in designating Sunday as the Lord's day it makes a religious discrimination. The ruling was made in the case of the state against Dan Kellaher, an appeal from a conviction in the district court. The decision of Judge Gantenbein means that Judge Gatens' temporary injunction restraining the enforcement of the law will be made permanent.

Insurance Agents Held Liable.

Salem.—Because many insurance agents in Oregon have contended they were not responsible for the payment of the premium on a policy issued at the request of another agent who delivers the policy to the insured, Harvey Wells, state insurance commissioner, has issued a bulletin declaring that his department would hold agents issuing such policies responsible for the premium's payment.
