BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

A recent rabbit drive at Silver Lake netted 3549.

For the 11 months of this year Marion county has expended \$251,922 on its roads.

Property losses, as a result of a 10 days' storm on Tillamook Bay, will amount to about \$35,000.

Forty-one carloads of cattle, sheep and hogs left Klamath county last week on a "stock special."

The recent fall of snow throughout central Oregon is reported to have been a boon to the farmers.

All grain sown this fall in the valley of the middle fork of the upper Willamette is up and looking fine.

For the first time this year Portland postoffice receipts show a gain over the corresponding month of 1914.

Divorces in Multnomah county total approximately two-fifths of the number of marriages during the first ten months of 1915.

The railroad commission reports that sufficient freight cars are now being received to take care of the needs of shippers.

Four hundred and fifty persons attended the "fathers and sons" banquet of the tenth annual older boys' conference of western Oregon at Salem.

A campaign is under way to induce the Hood River county board to make an appropriation of \$20,000 for the support of the experiment station next year.

A club has been organized in Independence, consisting of about 40 business and professional men, to upbuild the city along economic, social and civic lines.

Klamath sportsmen are considering providing feeding grounds for wild ducks and geese on the marshes south of Klamath Falls, where now there is dense tule growth.

Five year contracts are being made with farmers to raise beets for a beet sugar mill at Medford. From \$4.25 to \$5 a ton is offered for the beets delivered at the mill.

Every county in Oregon, 33 states and 13 foreign countries are represented among the 1749 students which have registered at the Oregon agricultural college this year.

Pearl Peterson, 17-year-old daughter of Edward Peterson, committed suicide by shooting herself at the Peterson home near Manitou in the southern part of Clackamas county.

Three thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight persons, within 1000 of the census population of Oregon City, rode in the new municipal elevator in its 15 hours of operation Saturday.

Secretary of State Olcott has appealed to motor vehicle owners and chauffeurs to speed up their applications for licenses so that a heavy congestion early in the year may be avoided.

Six of the 13 applicants for admission to the practice of dentistry in the state of Oregon were passed at the regular semi-annual session of the Oregon state board of dental examiners, held in Portland.

The 2400-acre Clover Creek Stock ranch located in Clover Creek valley, near North Powder, has been sold by C. B. Mays to C. B. Higenbotham, of Echo, Umatilla county, at a reported consideration of \$60,000.

A new bridge to cost \$200,000 has been agreed upon by the commissioners of Marion and Polk counties. It will be thrown across the Willamette river at Salem. It will be of steel and concrete construction.

The I. X. L. gold mining property, consisting of 11 claims in the Baker district of Oregon, has been taken over under lease and bond by Spokane investors, and plans have been completed for equipping the mine with mill and shipping facilities.

The department of journalism of the University of Oregon has in its possession a Washington hand press, which the Oregon State Historical society, after an exhaustive investigation of all the evidence, reports to be the first press ever used west of the Rocky mountains.

Five members of the stock judging team of the Oregon agricultural college, together with one alternate and Professor E. L. Potter, left Corvallis Monday for Lewistown, Idaho, to compete with teams from other colleges in the northwest in judging farm animals at the fair stock show.

George L. Huffman, a farmer living south of Prairie City, despondent, while Mrs. Huffman was in another part of their home, called his three daughters, aged 4, 6 and 8 years, into a bedroom. He then gave each of them a tablet containing cyanide of potassium, taking one himself, and within 10 minutes all four were dead.

Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill has just published the most complete official directory yet compiled by the department of education. The directory lists all the schools of Oregon in which more than one teacher is employed, districts are arranged alphabetically and the names and addresses of the teachers and school clerks, together with much information regarding enrollment of pupils, salaries of teachers, tax levies and other matters are given.

JUSTICE THE BASIS OF TRUE CHARACTER

Failure to Recognize Justice
Has Brought World-War.

Justice the Foundation of God's Throne.
Justice the Underlying Principle of the Mosaic Law—Difference Between Justice and Love—Justice in the Home, in Business, in the Church. Appreciation of the Rights of Others. Love's Victory Through Self-Sacrifice.



PASTOR RUSSELL

Springfield, Mass., Aug. 1. — Pastor Russell is here today. He preached a strong sermon on the Golden Rule — "Whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them." — Matthew 7:12.

The first part of his discourse emphasized the importance of the principles of justice.

It is a common mistake, the speaker declared, to think that practically everybody recognizes these principles and applies them.

The trouble with the whole world, he asserted, is the failure to appreciate justice. While there is not much in fallen humanity to love, yet every human being calls for just treatment.

We have no right to be unjust to even an animal. Ours would be a wonderful world if every person in it would practise the Golden Rule.

There would be no "doing" a neighbor before he could "do" you. On the contrary, there would be a taking into account his weaknesses and his interests, a disdaining to take advantage of him.

Justice is the basic principle of the Mosaic Law. Thirty-five hundred years ago God entered into this Covenant with the children of Israel at Mount Sinai, and gave them the Ten Commandments, with the understanding that they must keep the Law if they would be the promised Seed of Abraham that would bless all mankind.

According to whether or not they would render justice, would do to their neighbor as they would wish him to do to them, would be the Divine decision as to their worthiness of being considered Abraham's Seed.

But they could not keep the Law. Their failure was due to humanity's fallen condition. (Romans 3:20.) Not one of them got the promised reward of everlasting life.

The Church and the Law.
The Pastor then discussed the Church's relation to the Divine Law, which they must keep as the Spiritual Seed of Abraham. (Galatians 3:8, 10, 29; Romans 8:4.)

Knowing that fallen humanity could not keep all His Law, God sent His Son, the Logos, into the world to help mankind. Our Lord was able to keep the Law and obtained its reward—everlasting life on the human plane.

This life He offered up sacrificially, and the merit of His sacrificial life constitutes a credit which will be applied for Adam and all his posterity at the end of this Gospel Age, as their Ransom-price. Then the whole world will be turned over to Him, and immediately He will begin His great work of blessing mankind.

The Church's first duty is to live up as nearly as possible to the Law standard, and then to present their bodies a living sacrifice, as those who walk in Jesus' steps. (Romans 12:1.)

Many Christians apparently do not see that God expects His people to keep the Law of Justice. While we cannot be absolutely just in thought, word and deed, yet there should be nothing less than this in our intentions. Selfishness is so deeply ingrained in our natural bodies that we fail to do perfectly.

But conditions are not the same with Christians as with Jews. (Romans 8:1.) If in the spirit of our minds we observe the Golden Rule, the blood of Jesus Christ is cleansing us from all imperfection.

Our Obligations to Others.
The remainder of the sermon set forth the practical application of the Golden Rule. Many of God's people seem not to realize that justice takes precedence of love. Christians are obligated to render justice. Everywhere we find injustice—between parents and children, employers and employees, between friends, neighbors and even in the Church.

A parent owes it to his children to provide them with a reasonable education, a religious home-training, and proper respect for his own rights and those of others. Very seldom will a rightly trained child run away from home, or fail in after years to manifest a proper gratitude for parental care received in childhood.

Of course employers cannot give everybody all that each would ask; for some people would ask for everything and then not be satisfied. But with the right kind of employer and employee, each would insist that the other should have his rights; each would consider what he would think right for the other to do, were their positions reversed. This course would make a great change in conditions.

As we think of what would be the right thing to do, and as we are willing to do it, we become more just in all our dealings. When we buy or sell, there is a reasonable way of doing. It is wrong to buy so as to make the seller lose money. If we were selling, we should expect to make a reasonable profit, not an unjust one. The employment of the Golden Rule would regulate all such matters.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Eighteen marriage licenses were issued in Benton county in June, 1915, as against 12 in 1913 and 20 in 1914.

Harvest has started in Umatilla county, and within another week the hum of the combine will be heard in every section.

Mrs. Elizabeth P. Lee, of Seattle, and Mrs. Mary Boles, of Corvallis, met at the Albany Chautauqua for the first time in 43 years.

The state industrial accident commission announces that for the week ending July 16, there were 142 accidents in Oregon.

O. Ross, a well known Southern Pacific engineer on the Woodburn-Lebanon run, died suddenly of heart trouble at his home in Albany.

George Avery was acquitted by the jury at Corvallis, which heard his trial on a charge of murdering Will Purdy, by stabbing him with a knife.

Pendleton will add 38 blocks to its paved street area this summer if proceedings begun by the council are carried to a successful conclusion.

The annual convention of the National and Oregon-Washington and British Columbia Laundrymen's associations opened in Portland beginning Monday and continued until Friday.

More than 100 horses have recently been shipped from Dallas by Will Tatom, who is acting as agent for eastern buyers who are supplying the demands of French and British army officers.

Three entomologists of London, England, visited Forest Grove last week and consulted with Cecil W. Creel, who has charge of a government laboratory on clover and grain pests.

Falling into a pan of hot water which had been left on the floor of their home, a few miles from Dallas, the 2-year-old girl of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Oscar was scalded so badly that death resulted.

All the leading denominations of the state will be represented at the third annual interdenominational conference of ministers to be held at the University of Oregon from Monday, July 26, to Friday, July 30.

Clackamas county Pomona Grange, at its quarterly meeting adopted a resolution favoring the purchase of the unsold lands in the railroad grant by the state of Oregon at the rate of \$2.50 an acre.

George E. Hardy, secretary of the Toledo Chamber of Commerce, telegraphed to the Portland, Or., Chamber of Commerce his acceptance of the position of manager of that organization. The place carries a salary of \$7500 a year.

The state land board rejected the request of Jason Moore that he be given an extension of time to January 1, 1917, in which to file a \$25,000 bond providing for the carrying out of the contract of lease for Summer and Abert lakes.

With but one dissenting vote, the Portland Central Labor Council adopted the revised report of the joint committee of their body and the Portland Chamber of Commerce, establishing "a joint conciliation board to promote industrial peace."

Professor H. S. Jackson, head of the department of botany and plant pathology of the Oregon Agricultural college for the past several years, has resigned to accept the office of chief of the botany department of the Purdue University experiment station.

A sweeping order of quarantine, covering all of Polk and Yamhill counties, was issued to become effective immediately. The order is signed by Frank Brown, president of the state live stock sanitary board, and W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian and secretary of the board.

By a unanimous vote of the city council of Roseburg, the mayor and city recorder were instructed to enter into a contract with the Roseburg & Eastern railroad company for the construction and operation of a railroad from Roseburg to the boundary of the national forest reserve, 30 miles east.

Scores of letters are being received by Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill in regard to the Oregon standard school plan and playground manual. Georgia, Alabama, Louisiana and Ohio are among those interested and their inquiries are largely a result of a visit to the state's educational exhibit at the San Francisco fair.

Many people who played a prominent part in making Oregon history were present at the funeral of Walter F. (Jack) Matthews. Few men in Portland were more widely known than was Mr. Matthews in the years that he was recognized as political dictator of Oregon, and those who came to pay him a final tribute included many who had been associated with him in politics. Judge Henry E. McGinn, who had known Mr. Matthews for nearly 50 years, made a brief address. He reviewed the active life of Mr. Matthews, telling of his early manhood and dwelling particularly on his political career. Many incidents of a personal nature were related.
