CUTTING DOWN KEYS

In order to cut down the number of keys to be carried in the pocket, a double key has been invented which will open two doors. The keys are placed end to end, but in order to afford the required grasp for the hand, each end portion is surrounded by a ring of rather square shape or conforming to the key end. This ring pivots upon a small collar that is put on the key rod just back of the end portion, and when used for a hand grasp, the ring lies in the same plane, but on the other end the ring is swung back so as to insert the key in the lock.

GERMAN OBJECT IN SERBIA IS GAINED

Way to Turkey is Now Open
and Operations Are Declared
Brought to a Close.

Berlin, via London.—With the re-occupation of Rudnik, the capture of 2700 prisoners and the flight of the scanty remains of the Serbian army into the Albanian mountains, Germany's operations against Serbia have been brought to a close, says the official statement issued at the headquarters of the general staff.

The object of these operations—the opening of communications with Bulgaria and the Turkish empire—has been accomplished, it is asserted.

London.—The greater portion of what remains of the Serbian northern army is believed to have crossed into the mountains of Albania and Montenegro, where the Serbs are continuing with the aid of King Nicholas' troops and supplies, which are reaching them from the Adriatic, to offer stern resistance to the Austro-German and Bulgarian invaders.

Like the Belgians, however, the Serbians hold only a fringe of their country, which widens as it reaches the southwestern corner, of which Monastir is the center.

The Serbian main army, having been driven back to the borders of Albania and Montenegro, where it is being attacked by the Austro-Germans, the Bulgarians, with the assistance of General von Gallwitz' forces, are now giving their attention to the Anglo-French troops.

The Bulgarians appear to have abandoned definitely for the time being their advance on Monastir to attack the French positions on the Cerina.

WHEAT IN STORAGE SEIZED BY CANADA

Ottawa, Ont.—The Canadian government has commandeered all high-grade wheat in elevators from Fort William, on Lake Superior, to the Atlantic coast.

The action was taken under the special war act by the Canadian Grain Commission. The wheat seized was of grades No. 1 hard and Nos. 1, 2 and 3 northern. It was the property of grain shippers and millers.

A revised estimate places the amount at about 20,000,000 bushels. A considerable amount is the property of American grain dealers.

It is officially announced that the price will be fairly adjusted and the grain growers paid promptly by the Canadian government. It is estimated that there still is in Canada, in the hands of farmers and dealers west of Fort William, 150,000,000 bushels surplus of wheat available for export. It is expected that most of this will be taken in the future for the use of Great Britain, France and Italy.

GREECE STILL IS DILATORY

London Loses Optimism as it Hears
Allies' Demands Further Put Off.

London.—London's cheerful view of the Greek situation has been succeeded by something in the nature of a reaction, and the prevailing opinion at the present time is that the press and public jumped too quickly to the agreeable conclusion that Greece would concede readily all the allies' demands.

Although all the forecasts and speculation regarding Greece's reply to the entente ministers' new note, embodying the detailed demands of their governments that Greece guarantee security and liberty of action to the Franco-British troops on Greek soil, continue to be optimistic, the latest information from Athens clearly indicates that Greece has not yet definitely abandoned the dilatory tactics which caused the allies such uneasiness.

RAILROADS ARE CONGESTED

Agents Given Orders to Accept No
More Freight.

New York.—The Delaware, Lackawanna & Western railroad, whose lines are choked as far back as Scranton with loaded freight cars it cannot move, instructed its agents to accept no more freight for export until further notice.

More than 6000 loaded cars from the west, all containing grain, feed, flour, copper and hundreds of other commodities, have virtually turned the terminals and sidings of the road into a storage warehouse for weeks.

Inquiry at other railroad offices developed that nearly every road with a terminus here is glutted with freight cars standing loaded and idle on sidings for hundreds of miles back along the line and that other roads would follow the Lackawanna's lead shortly.

GENERAL KUROPATKIN



General Kuropatkin, of Russo-Japanese war fame, reported in command of the Russian army which will attack Bulgaria.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

Late reports from Mesopotamia show that the British hold the battlefield of Otosiphon, and that the Turks are retreating to Dialah, within 10 miles of Bagdad.

The Turks are showing more activity in the Gallipoli peninsula, where, with new supplies and ammunition, they have made an attack on the allies' positions without, however, making any gains.

The Serbian forces soon will become an army without a country, unless the French should defeat the Bulgarians. Closely pursued by the Austrians, the Serbs are crossing the frontier into Montenegro, west of Mitrovitz, it is stated officially at Vienna.

In Galicia the Austro-Germans are attacking in the hope of compelling the Russians to divert a part of the Bessarabian army thence. While the Austrians opposing the Italian offensive on the Isonzo are unable to get assistance, they are counter attacking with terrific fury.

For some reason, variously explained, the Bulgarians have halted their march on Monastir. It is said in some dispatches that, having reoccupied a part of Macedonia, largely inhabited by their fellow nationals, the Bulgarian people and government are disinclined to push any farther west.

The situation along the Roumanian frontier, where a great Russian force is said to have been gathered, is still obscure. It is reiterated that General Alexei Kuropatkin is to command this Russian army of invasion, which will either be sent up the Danube or allowed to pass through Roumania to attack Verna from the land side.

SHORT NEWS NUGGETS

Charles M. Schwab has accepted membership in the board of trustees of Cornell University.

Ten dead, 20 injured and 30 homes demolished was the toll of the tornado which swept a path of desolation two miles southeast of Hot Springs, Ark. Request is to be made of congress to permit two envoys from the women voters of the west to speak from the floor of the house of representatives at the next session.

American foreign trade rose to the new high level of \$5,900,000,000 in the 12 months ending with October, 1915, according to figures made public by the department of commerce.

Because of unsettled conditions in China the United States has ordered Brigadier General Morrison, in command of American troops at Tientsin, to remain at this station until spring, when he will be placed in command at Manila.

Charles C. Crowley, a private detective, was arrested by federal officers at San Francisco on a charge of plotting to dynamite ships carrying munitions to the allies and admitted that he was an investigator in the pay of the German consulate.

Turks' Submarine Aids Rescue Work.

New York.—A Turkish submarine stopped the British passenger ship Barullos in the Mediterranean and, after 25 persons had been drowned, assisted in rescuing many of the 250 passengers who had gone overboard in a panic, according to Eleanor Franklin Egan, an eyewitness, who arrived on the steamship New York.

Kitchener Visits Rome.

Rome, via Paris.—Field Marshal Earl Kitchener, British secretary for war, had an hour's interview with Premier Salandra and later conferred with Baron Sonnino, secretary of foreign affairs.

German Cruiser is Sunk.

London.—The German protected cruiser Frauenlob has been sunk by a submarine of the entente allies off the southern coast of Sweden, according to a semi-official announcement made at Petrograd.
