TO PROTECT COUNTY ROADS

County Court Fixes Size of Tires in Proportion to Loads.

Motor trucks with solid tires have been barred from the McKenzie River highway from Thurston, seven miles east of Eugene, to Blue River, a total distance of nearly forty miles. The order was made by the court at the same time other regulations were made to prevent destruction of roads in the winter time by excessive weights or narrow tires. It is effective until May 1.

Power to regulate the class and amount of traffic over the roads was authorized by the District Attorney.

The order further says that the maximum weight hauled by vehicle with inflated tires shall not exceed 1500 pounds. For horse-driven vehicles with tires 1 1/2 inches wide, the weight shall not exceed 1500. Twenty-five hundred pounds is allowed for vehicles with tires 2 1/4 inches wide. Vehicles with three-inch tires may haul 2500 pounds, and vehicles having four-inch tires may haul as high as 3500 pounds.

Violations can be punished on charges of contempt of court.

Jobless Man Buys Seals.

An old man with his coat collar turned up, stopped at one of the Red Cross Christmas Seal booths in Portland and asked where the money realized from the sale was to be sent. When told that the money would be spent to fight tuberculosis, he remarked: "Then I'll take 5 cents worth. I would like to buy more seals, but I have only 5 cents left for my fare home. I've been out of work since the war began, and because this money is not for war which has put so many out of work, I'm glad to help all I can. My boy lost his job and had to go to the hospital on account of tuberculosis so I know that this Christmas seal work is mighty important."

As the old man faded away into the crowd, a well-dressed man bought 200 seals, remarking that he would put one on the back of each letter until Christmas Day. Then a lady asked for 50 seals and her little boy dug down into his pocket, proudly displayed a dime, and took 10 seals for the precious coin.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Dump Ore Makes First Class Road.

Baker.—That a new era in road-making in Baker county is at hand seems likely as the result of experiments made in the lower Powder section. Some months ago a section of road was built of ore from the dumps of the mines in the Virtue district. This piece of road is today a fine, smooth highway, tightly bound and improving with use. It contains enough talc as a binder and is in every way a success. There is a great quantity of this ore on the dumps at the Virtue, Flagstaff, Cyclone and other mines which are easy of access and the ore can be had for hauling away.

Non-Partisan Tariff Board Urged.

Pendleton.—Recommendation of a non-partisan tariff board, tariff regulation consistent with the attitude of sheepmen in past years; a pure fabric law for protection of the consumer, and repeal of the La Follette seaman act, were included in resolutions adopted at the close of the annual convention of the Oregon Wool Growers' association here. It was recommended also that congress appropriate \$100,000 for the construction of range improvements, and increase the appropriation for the extermination of predatory animals to \$300,000 biennially to check a \$15,000,000 annual stock loss.

Cos Bay Hatcheries Short of Eggs.

Marshfield.—The South Cos and North Coquille river fish hatcheries, superintended by Frank W. Smith, will be a little short of their usual amount of eggs this year, although the take is not at all discouraging. On Cos river the hatchery has between 5,500,000 and 6,000,000 eggs, while the Coquille hatchery will have about 4,000,000. On South Cos, the retaining racks were washed out twice by high water and before the first damage was well repaired, the big flood came and all hope of securing more salmon was abandoned.

SCOPE OF STUDY LARGER

O. A. C. Winter Short Course to Open on January 10.

Corvallis.—The annual winter short course, which will be held at the Oregon Agricultural College, January 10 to February 4, 1916, promises to be wider in scope than in any previous year, and is characterized by three special features, which include the reorganization of the work to meet the special needs of the year, individual instruction wherever possible and round-table discussions and experience reports.

The work this year will be arranged so far as possible to prevent repetition of former short-course work. Every branch of agricultural industry from growing to manufacturing and marketing will receive special consideration at the hands of the trained specialists of the college staff, and at the same time comprehensive courses in home economics embracing every phase of household science will be offered to the women of Oregon by the college faculty in the departments of domestic science and domestic art.

Marketing of dairy products, drainage of the wet lands of Oregon, rural organization and rotation of crops, all recognized as among the leading problems of the present-day agriculturist, will get special attention.

Registration to Start January 3.

Salem.—Registration of voters for the 1916 elections, under the new permanent system of registration adopted by the last legislature, will begin on January 3 in all counties in Oregon. Through the passage of the new law it will not be necessary hereafter for voters to register more than once unless he changes his residence or fails to vote at least once within the biennial period, ending November 30, after the regular biennial general election.

Work Stopped on Main Umatilla Canal

Hermiston.—With the completion of the main canal of the west extension of the Umatilla project, work has been discontinued for the winter months, owing, it is said, to climatic conditions. The canal is about 27 miles long, is concreted throughout and cost approximately \$375,000. The laterals, it is understood, will also be of concrete, work to begin on these with the opening of spring weather.

Cattle Quarantine Partly Raised.

Pendleton.—The state sanitary board held its annual meeting in Pendleton and took action to amend the order for quarantine for the foot and mouth disease which lets in cattle from districts heretofore infected with the disease where the government has given certification that the district is now clean.

PUT CONSULS UNDER SEARCHING INQUIRY

Washington.—Developments which have followed the request for withdrawal of Captain Boyed and Captain Franz von Papen, naval and military attaches of the German embassy, indicated that the state department would conduct a wide investigation of foreign consular officials in the United States whose suspected activities, in some instances, are looked on with extreme disfavor.

In making formal announcement of his action, Secretary Lansing said the attaches had rendered themselves persona non grata to the United States government by improper activities in connection with naval and military matters.

The complaints against Von Papen and Boyed were accumulative, dating back to the early days of the European war. The case against them is peculiar, not being capable of legal proof. It consisted of an accumulation of suspicious circumstances and conditions which connected the attaches with attempts to violate the neutrality laws of the United States.

Asks Reasons for Attache Withdrawal

Washington.—Count von Bernstorff presented to the state department a communication asking for the reasons for the request for the withdrawal of Captain Boyed and Captain von Papen, the German naval and military attaches, respectively.

CHINESE CREW MUTINIES

Ships and Arsenal Shelled and Shots Fall in Shanghai Foreign Quarter.

Pekin.—The government announces that it has received a telegram from General Yang at Shanghai, saying that the Chinese cruiser Chao-Ho has been recaptured from its crew, which mutinied Sunday night and opened fire on two other warships and the Kaing-Nan arsenal.

It is said that a rebel land movement against the arsenal was repulsed and that peace has been restored.

Shanghai.—The crew of the Chinese cruiser Chao-Ho mutinied and opened fire on two other warships and the arsenal. The fire was returned, the engagement lasting an hour. Several shots fell in the foreign concessions. Apparently the outbreak has been confined to Chao-Ho.

Spies on Steamer.

San Francisco.—San Francisco representatives of the Great Northern Steamship company admitted the reported presence on the crippled steamship Minnesota of a man named Martin, who is suspected of being an employee of a German consular agent, and that Martin boasted in Seattle that the vessel would never reach its destination.
