THE LINER ORDUNA HAS NARROW ESCAPE

Steamer With 227 Passengers Including 21 Americans Attacked by Submarine

New York.—The Cunard liner Orduna bound from Liverpool to New York with 227 passengers, including 21 Americans, was attacked without warning, it was learned on her arrival here, by a German submarine on the morning of July 9.
Twenty miles from the graveyard of the Lusitania, off Oldhead of Kin sale, the Orduna escaped the Lusitania's fate by half a second of time or 10 yards of space, the German torpedo churning the water that distance behind the liner's rudder. Then the Orduna sped away. She was followed by the submarine, which rose to the surface, manned a gun on her deck and shelled the fleeing steamer.
The attack was at 10 minutes to 6 o'clock in the morning, when all but a few of her passengers lay sleeping in their berths. Aroused by stewards the passengers dressed hurriedly and went to the upper deck, where they put on life belts and took their places at the lifeboats. They heard the scream of the shells and saw the ocean spit up columns of water where the shells struck.
Ten minutes before the attack a sailing ship, with two American flags painted on her side, was seen ahead. Captain Taylor became suspicious of this craft and began manuevering his ship. Then came the attack, the first warning of which was the streak of a torpedo which whirled through the water and missed the Orduna's stern by ten yards or thereabouts.

Baked Quinces—Cut quinces in half without peeling, remove seeds and core and boil until well done but not tender enough to break up. Place in baking pan, fill center of each half with sugar and a small bit of butter. Moisten the filling slightly with water, and have enough water in pan to keep from burning, as when baking apples. If there is any juice left in the pan when done, pour it over the quinces. Bake in rather slow oven for half an hour. Eaten with or without cream, they are delicious.
